SUBJECT: Chief's Commendation - Cst. Steve Genore

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

For the Board to review and acknowledge Cst. Genore for his exceptional efforts.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

Cst. Steve Genore while off duty was unloading groceries from his vehicle in the laneway of his residence when he heard a male yelling "help me, help me."

Cst. Genore ran over to where he could hear the male in distress, and realized that the address was an address that he had been to before for previous disputes in the course of his patrol duties. While the yelling at the residence was still occurring, the victim opened the door where Cst Genore observed the victim holding his chest and noted blood running down his arm and stomach. Although the male attempted to swing the door shut, Cst Genore acted quickly opening the door before it closed, and requested the victim come outside where it was safe.

It was at this time Cst Genore called dispatch and requested assistance. After the phone call was placed to members of the Belleville Police Service, Cst Genore held the wound for victim and attempted to build rapport, to keep him calm while laying down against the truck. Cst Genore noted that the victim began feeling weaker and just wanted to lay down. Cst Genore kept calm and continued to apply pressure to the wounds.

When the first patrol units arrived, Cst Genore continued to take charge in a very stressful situation, requesting that another officer take over applying pressure to the victim's wounds. Cst Genore advised attending officers of what he noted out of place in the residence when he arrived on scene. Cst Genore also ensured that responding officers used available trauma kits to assist with the victims injuries. Once the above noted information had been relayed to officers, Cst. Genore advised attending officers to go to the back of the residence, as Cst.

Genore was aware that the suspect was still inside the residence, and wanted to ensure that area was contained.

The actions of Cst. Genore were exceptional and worthy of a Chief's Commendation. The training our members receive is not just applicable when they are on duty but off duty as well. It is often said that a police officer is a police officer 24 hours a day, regardless of whether they are on duty or not and this is a great example of that ideology.

Please join me in congratulating Cst. Steve Genore and all the members of "B" Platoon for their exceptional actions during this Attempt Murder call.

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

INFORMATION FACTORS:

Over the course of two-night shifts on October 17 & 18th "B" Platoon was involved in two major investigations and excelled in both cases. The entire platoon needs to be commended for their excellent work.

On Monday October 17th "B" Platoon was involved in an attempted murder scene where the victim was initially aided by an off-duty officer and then "B" Platoon arrived on scene and continued the investigation with the assistance of the Criminal Investigations Division as the lead.

On Tuesday October 18th "B" Platoon was involved in another very complex suicide investigation in which the person of concern was located due to the quick actions of the officers. Unequivocally, the "B" Platoon officers' quick actions saved the life of person in question. This was a very complex investigation whereby the officers did not have much time to gather potential leads and a video from a neighbourhood led the officers to the location of where the person of concern was.

These types of calls while very rewarding also have a cumulative impact on the officer's well-being. I would like to thank and commend these officers for their quick life saving actions over the span of two days.

Chief Callaghan noted that Constable Gauthier is currently attending Police College and invited Special Constable Turnbull to come forward.

Chief Callaghan stated that, in his opinion, the training provided to Belleville Police Service Officers is one of the best in the Province, and when the Officers took the initiative to commence CPR on a vital signs absent young woman, it is remarkable to see the training put into action.

Chair Councillor Allsopp thanked the Officers for their lifesaving actions.

(b) Acting Sergeant Paul Fyke appeared before the Board in recognition of his commitment to road safety and his participation in the Joint Traffic Initiative "Safe on 62" with the O.P.P. and Ministry of Transportation. CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

INFORMATION FACTORS:

The information contained in this report reflects a strong correlation to the number of decreases that we have witnessed with the Crime Statistics report.

Belleville Police Service Courts Services

The unit consists of police officers, special constables, and two full-time and one part-time civilian support staff, who maintain an office at the court facilities.

Court Office


The Court unit liaises with the Crown Attorney, Court Administrator, Provincial Prosecutors, Probation Office and Victim/Witness Services as well as other police and civilian agencies with a view to ensuring that police charges are properly prepared and processed through the courts. They are also responsible for providing service in relation to serving court-related documents, court appearances, bail hearings, trials, transfer of charges as well as maintaining accurate and timely records on Niche and CPIC. Members of the unit are in frequent contact with a host of other police services and agencies such as the Judiciary, Defence Counsel, Court Administrative Staff, public and private agencies regarding victims and offenders as well as the general public. The Unit prepares Criminal Code information for charges on behalf of the probation officer, and notifies and cancels witnesses as required. Additionally, the unit ensures that Crown instructions for pending court proceedings are relayed to officers.


During the third quarter of 2023, 77 Criminal Code charges were processed and laid by the Court office staff compared to 125 during 2022 which is a 38% decease.

What is a bail hearing?

If police do not release the person who has been arrested, they must bring the person before a justice for a bail hearing within 24 hours or as soon as possible. A bail hearing is a procedure where a judge or a justice of the peace determines whether a person charged with an offence should be released or held in custody pending trial. On the appearance date, the accused may enter into a consent release situation whereby certain conditions are agreed upon and must be followed, elect to run a hearing to be released if there is no consent by the Crown for release, or ask that the hearing be adjourned in order to find a suitable surety to attend court to assist with the release conditions and supervising the accused.

During the third quarter of 2023, there were a total of 337 instances where an officer was required in court with regard to a bail hearing being scheduled, whether it was a first appearance or an additional appearance due to an adjournment, compared to 280 in 2022 which is a 20% increase.





Court Security - Special Constables


Special Constables are civilian members who play an important role within the Belleville Police Service. Once hired, the Chief of Police swears in members as Peace Officers. Special Constable is a designation issued by the province of Ontario providing members with a limited Law Enforcement role in the City of Belleville.

The Special Constables ensure the security of Justices, Judges, Justices of the Peace, Court staff, all occupants of the courthouse, all persons taking part in or attending court proceedings, and the security of court buildings during the hours when the courts are operating. They provide professional care, custody, and transportation of people who are in custody from various detention facilities as well as anyone taken into custody during court proceedings. The unit escorts prisoners within the courthouse to ensure timely, safe and secure appearances in the required courtrooms. The Special Constables are also used for special events, subpoena service, ground searches, and any other duties assigned by the supervisor to assist other units.

Special Constables are responsible for fingerprinting and gathering DNA samples for the DNA Data Bank. Under the Canadian Criminal Code, judges can order those convicted of designated offences to provide samples for DNA analysis. Young offenders can be included in the DNA Data Bank. The DNA Data Bank helps investigators identify suspects, link crime scenes where there are no suspects, eliminate suspects, and determine if a serial offender may be involved in a crime. DNA kits are prepared by the RCMP National DNA Data Bank and supplied to the Service. The Special Constable has to take the offender's fingerprints and blood droplets for submission. The Unit completed 13 DNA court-ordered samples in the third quarter of 2023 compared to 16 in 2022 which is a 19% decrease.


As part of the Court Security Plan, Special Constables staff the entrance of the courthouse to operate the magnetometer and x-ray machine in order to screen individuals entering the courthouse. They are looking for any items that may pose a security risk such as guns, knives, scissors, etc. If an item is found, the individual is given the option of removing it from the courthouse to allow entry or forfeiting it for destruction.


The following graphs indicate the number of persons screened during the third quarter of 2023 for a total 7,324 compared to 6,690 in 2022, which is a 9% increase.




The Quinte Courthouse serves two Police Services, four OPP detachments and the Military Police within the County of Hastings: Belleville Police Service, Tyendinaga Police Service and the Military Police, Quinte West OPP, Centre Hastings OPP, North Hastings OPP and Prince Edward County OPP (for bail hearings only).

Prisoner transportation is shared between the Belleville Police Service and Quinte West OPP who supply two Special Constables to operate their prisoner transport vehicle. There is the requirement to attend at the Quinte Detention Centre (Napanee) in the morning to pick up prisoners and then to return the prisoners at the conclusion of court. On a weekly rotation basis, Belleville Police Service is responsible for either the morning transport or the afternoon. The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners transported during the third quarter of 2023 for a total of 410 (71% increase from 240 in 2022) prisoners; 229 (39% increase from 165 in 2022) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 181 (141% increase from 75 in 2022) prisoners for the other services and OPP detachments.











The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled at the Quinte Courthouse. This is where a prisoner is arrested the day before or day of the court appearance. The prisoner is not transported on the escort wagon and would not be captured in the transportation stats. In this case, the prisoner would attend the courthouse to be housed, escorted to the courtroom, and released.

In the third quarter of 2023 the number of prisoners transported was 410 compared to 489 prisoners handled.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled during the third quarter of 2023 for a total of 489 (91% increase from 256 in 2022) prisoners; 269 (49% increase from 181 in 2022) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 220 (193% increase from 75 in 2022) for the other services and OPP detachments.

SUBJECT: CRIME STATISTICS - 3RD QUARTER REPORT 2023

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

For the Board to review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

In the third quarter of 2023 we are witness to a decrease in several areas of criminal activity, while this is encouraging it is paramount to ensure that this is only one quarter and as such it should not be considered as a trend.

Total Crimes:

During the third quarter of 2023, there were 1,081 crimes reported (94 unfounded) for an actual of 987 "crimes" compared to the 1,399 (104 unfounded) reported during the third quarter of 2022. This represents an 23% decrease in reported crimes.

Homicide and Attempt Murder:

There was one report of an attempt murder during the third quarter of 2023. Shots were fired downtown on the west side of Front Street on August 12, 2023. Fortunately, there were no injuries resulting from the incident. Belleville Police arrested the two accused parties in relation to the attempt murder. A 24-year-old male was arrested in Kingston and charged with Attempt to Commit Murder using a Restricted Firearm, Careless use of a Firearm, Possession of a Weapon for a Dangerous Purpose, Disguise with Intent, Discharge Firearm with Intent, Failure to comply with Undertaking (x3) and Possession of a Firearm contrary to Prohibition Oder. A 20-year-old male was arrested in Quinte West and charged with Attempt to Commit Murder using a Restricted Firearm, Discharge Firearm with Intent and Fail to Comply with Probation Order. A second shooting incident was reported on September 18, 2023 resulting in a homicide. The victim was found deceased in the area of North Front Street and Ridley Street. The Criminal Investigations Division is actively investigating the circumstances surrounding this homicide investigation.

These two major case incidents continue to significantly strain the resources of the Belleville Police Service.

During the third quarter of 2022, there was one homicide reported in early July and an attempt murder reported in late September. Belleville Police arrested and charged a 30-year-old male with Second Degree Murder along with numerous other offences as a result of the July homicide. As for the attempt murder, two males and one female were arrested in Kingston shortly after the incident. The two males were charged with attempt murder along with numerous other offences.

Robberies:

There were 10 robberies reported in the third quarter of 2023, compared to 9 robberies reported during the same time last year. This represents a 11% increase in robberies from 2022.

Break and Enters:

During the third quarter of 2023, there were 41 break and enters reported (4 unfounded) for an actual of 37. This is a 41% decrease compared to the 69 (5 unfounded) break and enters reported in the third guarter of 2022.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 28 reported thefts of motor vehicles (2 unfounded) for an actual of 26 during the third quarter of 2023. This is a 36% decrease in comparison to the third quarter of 2022 where 44 motor vehicle thefts (5 unfounded) were reported.

Assaults:

There were 74 assaults reported (4 unfounded) for an actual of 70 for the third quarter of 2023. During the same period in 2022, there were 107 assaults reported (10 unfounded) which represents a 31% decrease in assaults.

Sex Offences:

There were 32 sexual offences reported (1 unfounded) for an actual of 31 during the third quarter of 2023. During the third quarter of 2022, there were 65 (7

unfounded) sexual offences reported. This is a 51% decrease in sexual offences.

Frauds:

There were 79 frauds reported (5 unfounded) for an actual of 74 reported during the third quarter of 2023. Similarly, during the third quarter of 2022 there where 77 frauds reported (5 unfounded). This represents a 3% increase in frauds.

Drug Offences:

There were 14 drug offences (2 unfounded) reported in the third quarter of 2023. During the same time last year, there were 25 drug offences reported. This is a 44% decrease from 2022.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 39 criminal harassment incidents (14 unfounded) for an actual of 25 reported in the third quarter of 2023. This is a 20% decrease from the same period in 2022, where 49 (8 unfounded) harassment incidents were reported.

Utter Threats:

During the third quarter of 2023, there were 40 incidents reported (6 unfounded) for an actual of 34 incidents of uttering threats. This represents a 17% decrease compared to the third quarter of 2022 which had 48 (15 unfounded) incidents reported.

Arson:

There were 3 reports of arson (0 unfounded) reported during the third quarter of 2023. These numbers are identical to the reported arsons from the same time frame in 2022.

ViCLAS:

There were 21 ViCLAS submissions for the third quarter of 2023. One of the ViCLAS submissions was for a Homicide which the investigation is ongoing. The second major case ViCLAS submission was for an Attempt Murder which was cleared by charges. There were 15 ViCLAS submissions for Sexual Assaults (6 cleared by charge, 3 cleared as victim declines to proceed, and 6 are still under investigation). The remaining 4 ViCLAS submissions were for; Suspicious Persons and an Indecent Act.

This represents a 36% decrease compared to the 33 ViCLAS submissions for both criteria and non-criteria offences reported in the third quarter of 2022.

Presentations/Training:

On July 20, 2023, Detective Constable McGee assisted the Forensic Identification Services (FIS) Unit with a presentation to educate the newly recruited police officers regarding the use of forensics in assisting investigators trying to identify criminals involved in the more complex investigations. Fingerprints and DNA acquired from crime scenes have proven instrumental with identifying the involved parties in major crimes.

This quarterly report represents a synopsis of the investigations, community services and other duties performed by Constable Hans Verbeek School Response Officer.

Investigations

- 3 disturb the peace investigations were conducted

Assault:

- 2 sexual assault investigations were conduct and are on going

Ambulance Assist:

- 6 ambulance assist investigations were conducted

Mental health, Community services, Suspicious persons:

 6 police information/assistance, 6 community services, 5 traffic,2 theft, 4 unwanted persons,2 mental health, 5 suspicious persons,3 disturb the peace.

Other Investigations while assisting uniform patrol:

During the course of this quarter, investigations as an acting sergeant, traffic complaints, harassment, personal welfare checks, police assistance, and community services were conducted by Constable Verbeek.

In total, 57 Occurrences, 57 dispatches, 39 assignments, 27 reports, resulted in 3 total charges, 1 possession of stolen property, 1 possession of over 5g of dried cannabis by youth (314g).

Other community initiatives: Proactive

General Patrols consisted of the morning, lunch break and afternoon. Each day if time and call volume permit a general school patrol in the parking lots and adjacent areas were conducted during arrival and departure of students. Foot patrols were conducted at lunch time on a rotating school basis. These patrols have proven to be deterrents for a number of issues, including, however, not limited to Criminal Code breaches and other statutes enforced by police. Further this provides staff and students a sense of security and Community involvement.

9 formal presentations were conducted in a classroom setting with various topics covered. 6 impromptu presentations were conducted at the various high schools, including Eastside Secondary School, St. Theresa Secondary School, Nicholson Catholic College and Centennial Secondary School. The material consisted of a diverse array of topics ranging from general policing, cyber bulling, internet safety, as well as an open forum with a question and answer period.

Liaison with various community partners including, however, not limited to, Belleville Youth Justice Committee, Safe Schools advisory board, Youth Referral Diversion program.

General patrol in hallways and surrounding school areas such as "smoking areas" was conducted at all Belleville high schools on a daily basis. This strengthens the relationship and rapport with students as well as it provides a uniform presence.

Weekly follow up meetings regarding ongoing investigations and liaising with administrators to receive updates regarding student behavior. Meetings regarding Community Threat Assessment Protocol development and status involving community partners.

Other assignments:

Constable Verbeek consistently assists platoon supervisors in an acting Sgt role, which includes release of charged persons and other platoon duties, such as sudden death investigations, supervisor attendance. He has assisted with platoons with calls for service during platoon training sessions, and has been assigned OIC desk duties. Constable Verbeek was assigned to supervise YIPI students in the summer months, supervising and scheduling the students for the various work assignments carried out by the students.



CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

INFORMATION FACTORS:

The third quarter financial report is always challenging to report on as some of our financial expenditures have been expensed early in the first and second quarter. In the same token some of our grant allocations have not yet been paid to us and some even arrive in the first quarter of the following year.

The challenges we have experienced this year is in the same areas, which includes training, fuel and building maintenance. When we undertake utilizing a hybrid build for an emergency service provider building, there are some inherent challenges with the build along with choosing the lowest bidder for equipment.

We have spent an exorbitant amount of money on repairing items in this building that we believe should have not occurred in a building this age. As with any new building there are always gremlins to work out and we are in year three of occupancy. We are optimistic that in 2024 we should have most of these issues resolved.

You will note that in our Operational budget that we are 72.5% spent, which is essentially on target for 2023. For the Capital budget we are 91.3% spent which is right on target as most of our capital expenditures are in Q1 & Q2.

SUBJECT: Joint Forces Operation (Belleville P.S. and AGCO)

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

For the Board to review and file for information.

In response to concerns from residents and business owners in the downtown core concerning criminal behavior and nuisance calls at several licensed establishments, the Belleville Police Service liaised with the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario on a joint forces operation.

The initiative began on July 15 and ended on September 30th of this year and saw inspectors with AGCO partnered with uniformed officers to conduct compliance checks at various bars and restaurants in the downtown district. During the course of the six week operation a total of 69 checks were conducted and only one public safety violation was cited for Permitting Drunkeness under Regulation 746 S.43(1) of the Liquor Licence and Control Act.

The partnership between our two agencies will continue this fall and winter as further inspections are being planned. Arrangements have also been made for AGCO to issue by-weekly communication to our officers detailing any local complaints that they have received in order to ensure proactive measures are taken by our front line to address them. Officers with the Belleville Police Service have also begun sending information to AGCO utilizing their police reporting portal in order to provide them with additional information to support their investigations.

Finally, AGCO has agreed to have their inspectors attend at our headquarters this fall to meet with our front line staff to provide training and information about changes in regulations and powers that have been introduced post COVID.
