SUBJECT: CHIEF'S COMMENDATION FOR CST. KENDALL AND CST. SMITH

INFORMATON FACTORS:

On Saturday the 4th of March at 0330hrs, the Belleville Police Service received a call about a vehicle on the sidewalk on Dundas Street near the Belleville General Hospital. Officers arrived and found an elderly female slumped over the steering wheel. She was taken to BGH and pronounced deceased. Attempts to locate next of kin were negative until about 0700hrs. Officers spoke with the deceased's husband. The husband has a number of health issues and the deceased was the primary care giver. She was not feeling well and drove herself to the hospital and did not make it. Officers Jeff Smith and Greg Kendall did the notification and helped the husband of the deceased contact other family members to come and assist.

If you recall, Saturday morning was the end of a major snow storm that dropped between 20 and 30cm in Belleville. Officers Smith and Kendall, knowing the deceased husband was not capable and was expecting family to attend, took it upon themselves to shovel the driveway for them. The officers went above and beyond to help a family in need.



Chair Councillor Allsopp stated that the Board's 2023 Chair and Vice Chair Elections were conducted in a very brief General Meeting held prior to today's In Camera Meeting and that, he had been elected as Chair and Ms. Smith had been elected as Vice Chair.

5. **RECOGNITIONS**

Chair Councilor Allsopp stated that, due to work commitments, unfortunately the recipients of today's Recognitions will not be in attendance.

- (a) Constable Steven Genore and Constable Tyler Crawford are being recognized for their exceptional efforts in assisting an individual in crisis.

Chief Callaghan noted that Constable Genore and Constable Crawford are young Officers who are excelling in their positions.

The Officers responded to a suicidal call and used great tactical communication skills, to subdue the citizen and place him under arrest. Following the arrest, a loaded Glock 45 was found underneath the seat of his vehicle.

The Officers are commended for their compassion, empathy and quick thinking to deescalate and diffuse a potentially life-threatening situation.

On behalf of the Board, Chair Councillor Allsopp commended Constable Steven Genore and Constable Tyler Crawford for their great work.

- (b) Constable Matthew Sly is being recognized for his exemplary work in regards to a home invasion on August 23, 2022.

Chief Callaghan noted that again, Constable Sly is a young Officer who went above and beyond in carrying out an investigation, that would have been expected from a seasoned Investigator.

Constable Sly's "boots on the ground" work, utilization of technology and execution of his duties, with respect to search warrants, resulted in all three individuals being identified with two arrests being made.

Constable Sly's excellent work removed two hand guns and illegal drugs from the streets of the Quinte area.

On behalf of the Board, Chair Councillor Allsopp thanked Constable Matthew Sly for his great work on the case and follow through on the investigation.

- (c) Sergeant Mark Abrams, Constable Brenden Frazer, Constable Matthew Sly, Constable Chris Tijssen, Constable Laura White, Constable Michael Hart, Constable Jordan Wells, Constable Scott Tinsley and Constable Lindsay Stevenson are being recognized for their assistance to the Belleville Fire and Emergency Services on October 2, 2022 during the large fire on Station Street.

Chief Callaghan noted that the Officers are to be commended for their excellent work during this emergency stating that, it was a great example of the collaboration and co-operation of the tri-emergency services.

On behalf of the Board, Chair Councillor Allsopp recognized the efforts of the Officers and for the assistance they provided to the Belleville Fire and Emergency Services.

- (d) Staff Sergeant Jeremy Ashley, Sergeant Pat Comeau, Sergeant Kelly Menna and Sergeant Matthew Sweet are being recognized on their recent promotions.

Chief Callaghan noted that, a promotional process was held in the Fall of 2022 to fill vacancies within the organization as a result of retirements or relocations.

Chief Callaghan stated that the quality of the candidates that came forward was incredible noting that, Staff Sergeant Jeremy Ashley was promoted to Patrol Services, Sergeant Pat Comeau was promoted to Trainer and Quartermaster, Sergeant Kelly Menna to Forensic Identification and Sergeant Matthew Sweet, a member of the Tactical Unit to Patrol Services.

On behalf of the Board, Chair Councillor Allsopp congratulated the Officers on their promotions.

Mr. O'Brien thanked Chief Callaghan and Deputy Chief Barry for bringing forward these exemplary situations and agreed that the Officers represent the very best of Police conduct.

Vice Chair Smith noted that the presentations provided at these Meetings help inform Board Members and felt it is worthwhile attending. Meetings are most often attended by Mr. Graham Wight, Ministry of the Solicitor General's Office Zone 2 representative, as well as the Director of the Association of Police Services Boards.

(a) Axon Body Worn Camera and Taser Project (10:12 a.m.)

Chief Callaghan's report dated January 19, 2023 was before the Board.

THAT the Belleville Police Services Board approve the replacement of the Belleville Police Service tasers with the Axon OSP7+ option.

Chief Callaghan advised that the current tasers are outdated and no longer supported and called upon Deputy Chief Barry to update the Board in this regard.

Deputy Chief Barry noted that tasers are the most important use of force option, other than lethal, for frontline Officers.

Deputy Chief Barry provided a high-level briefing to the Board noting the advantages of the new Taser OSP7+, most importantly being that the taser provides increased Officer safety, and with each Officer being issued a taser allows for better accountability, better care and maintenance.

Deputy Chief Barry noted that, currently the Service has a five-year contract with Axon and by combining both the body worn cameras and tasers will allow for better pricing. In addition, Axon is also offering a cost savings to the Service.

Deputy Chief Barry indicated that the OSP7+ is being recommended, which allows for virtual reality training, redaction assistant, live streaming, third party video playback, video auto-tagging, etc.

Chief Callaghan demonstrated taser use and indicated his support of the OSP7+ tasers.

Deputy Chief Barry stated that the Information Technology team was instrumental in the body worn camera training, and will also be involved with the OPS7+ taser training, however the virtual training is scenario based as opposed to instructional use and invited the Board to participate.

Chief Callaghan stated that with the OSP7+ features Officers, if necessary, can be provided immediate corrective training reducing liability and potential lawsuit issues.

In reply to a question from Mr. O'Brien, Deputy Chief Barry indicated that the Service is comfortable with the purchase of 92 tasers.

In reply to a question from Vice Chair Smith, Chief Callaghan stated that historically, the “unwanted person” calls relate to the same group of individuals. Some of the individuals in our community suffering from homelessness, mental health or addiction issues are somewhat transient and tend to spend the summer here and return to Toronto in the winter.

Chief Callaghan stated the Welcoming Streets Belleville and additional social support organizations in the community assist greatly in reducing the number of calls.

Chief Callaghan noted that, as previously mentioned, mental health issues need to be addressed and while some behavior is unacceptable, which would be dealt with by the judicial system, in most cases the judicial system is not the right answer to the problem.

Vice Chair Smith also inquired if the number of “personal welfare checks”, which are on the rise, also tend to be the same individuals and wondered what a typical call would involve.

Chief Callaghan indicated that, when calls are received from a family member or associate of an individual in regards to their well-being, Officers will make contact to ensure their safety.

In reply to a question from Vice Chair Smith in regards to the increase in reported thefts, Chief Callaghan stated that it could be an anomaly, however Sergeant Cuomo plans to undertake a "Lock It or Lose It" program.

Vice Chair Smith stated she would like to acknowledge Constable Verbeek for the great work he carries out within the City's schools, noting the proactive work undertaken in High Schools. Vice Chair Smith wondered if, with the influence of social media could the same be offered for Grades 6, 7 and 8 and questioned if the School Boards have been contacted in this regard.

Chief Callaghan advised that, historically an Officer has represented the High Schools and a School Liaison Officer the Public Schools, however due to staffing shortages the School Liaison Officer has not been in place. However, with the proposed Budget it is hoped the program can be reinstated noting the School Boards embrace the concept of Officers in schools.

Report

In reply to a question from Mr. O'Brien, Chief Callaghan advised that the Belleville Emergency Response Team's (ERT) involvement in a high risk take down in Kingston was in regards to a homicide investigation. The Kingston Police Service was notified that, as the matter was evolving quickly, the Belleville ERT would be carrying out the take down, which occurred without incident.

Chief Callaghan noted that Belleville's ERT are trained by the Ottawa Police Service which includes hostage rescue capability, and should the OPP True Team not be available, Belleville's ERT could act.

Chief Callaghan stated that, as a result of that training, during the convoy occupation in downtown Ottawa and Canada Day celebrations, Belleville's ERT fit seamlessly into Ottawa Police Service operations.

The Officers' high level of training puts the City of Belleville in a great position to react to any situation that arises.

In regards to visual reality training, Chief Callaghan noted that, Deputy Chief Barry has advised that the Axon Group will expand the training areas and it is hoped it will include tactical scenarios.

(j) 2022 3rd Quarter OIPRD Complaints

Mr. O'Brien felt that, over the past several years, the culture within the Service is being reflected by the decreasing number of OIPRD complaints and congratulated Chief Callaghan, Deputy Chief Barry and Senior Executive for achieving the focused positive culture within the Service.

Chief Callaghan stated that, the training and standards the Belleville Police Service sets when hiring Officers, results in a high-quality individual being recruited, which has a direct correlation to the level of service provided to the community.

Deputy Chief Barry felt, that the Board's investment in the body worn cameras, which allows quick resolve of complaints as interactions are recorded, has also attributed to the lower number of OIPRD complaints.

Chief Callaghan stated that, the SIU should be held accountable for their decisions and referred to SIU charges faced by two Officers when there was no reasonable success of prosecution, which ended up costing the City approximately \$200,000.00. The previous Board forwarded a letter to the Solicitor General requesting reimbursement, which was not forthcoming.

- b) ensure that in the event the owner of money cannot be traced or does not come forward, and after a lapse of 90 days, the funds may be deposited into the In Trust account;
- c) ensure that the appropriate accounting and audit systems are in place to protect the integrity of money deposited into the fund and distribution of the money from the account;
- d) ensure that an In Trust report be part of the quarterly information report to the Board;
- e) In Trust funds may be utilized at the discretion of the Chief of Police with the Chief keeping the Board apprised of expenditures.

It is the policy of the Belleville Police Services Board with respect to conducted energy weapons (CEWs) that the Chief of Police will:

- a) ensure that the type of CEW has been approved for use by the Solicitor General;
- b) ensure procedures are in place with respect to pre-shift and post shift CEW checks and maintenance (e.g., contacts, cartridges, batteries, spark test, etc.) and submit a report in all instances where a CEW is deployed;
- c) ensure an accurate inventory of all CEW devices, including the operational status and current location of each CEW;
- d) ensure that prior to Officers using a CEW they will have considered whether de-escalation techniques or other force options have not, or will not, be effective in diffusing the situation;
- e) train Officers to issue a verbal warning so the subject is aware that a CEW is about to be deployed;
- f) direct Officers to avoid extended cycling of CEWs unless a single deployment is ineffective in eliminating the risk or in allowing the Officer(s) to gain physical control of the subject;
- g) develop and maintain procedures where CEW use should be avoided Including:
 - (i) on a restrained subject;

- (ii) on a woman known to be pregnant, elderly person, young child or visibly frail person;
 - (iii) on a sensitive area of the body (e.g., head, neck, genitals); and
 - (iv) on a subject in control of a moving vehicle, bicycle, snowmobile or other conveyance;
- h) ensure training policy, including minimum training requirements for Officers authorized to deploy a CEW; for those Officers who supervise Officers who carry a CEW; and those Officers authorized to provide CEW training courses;
 - i) ensure all CEW training is documented and meets the training requirements established by the Solicitor General;
 - j) ensure Officers employing CEWS and CEW trainers/instructors receive regular and documented recertification (every two years is the recommended minimum);
 - k) ensure CEWs undergo regular testing and only those that test within approved operating parameters should be used for field deployment;
 - l) ensure that any CEW used proximal to an incident resulting in death or serious injury should be immediately sent for testing, while respecting appropriate legislated police service obligations or practices related to such investigations;
 - m) ensure, where operationally feasible and taking into consideration the availability of health care professionals, medical assistance should be sought as soon as practicable when a situation necessitates multiple or extended cycling of a CEW. Medical assistance should be sought when an individual has any apparent injuries, is in obvious distress, or requests medical assistance.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

The Belleville Police Service has had a very successful Auxiliary Constable Program for over 20 years. The Belleville Police Service Auxiliary Constable Program is coordinated through Training Officer Sergeant Pat Comeau and has 12 active volunteers. The Auxiliary Program supports and assists the Police Service with:

- General patrol
- R.I.D.E Program
- Community events
- Emergency call-outs

The Auxiliary Constable Program members show their support for the Belleville Police Service and the community by volunteering at city-wide special events, such as the Santa Claus Parade, Remembrance Day Parade, Waterfront Festival, Canada Day celebrations, and the Cops and Kid Fishing Derbies. Since the Unit was formed in 1985, the Auxiliary Program members have participated in a variety of fund-raising activities for:

- Torch Run - NHL Alumni game
- Operation COVID-19 in conjunction with United Way and the Good Food Box Program
- Field of Abilities

The members of the Auxiliary Constable Program receive their initial training and then join the training rotation with the rest of the team, members are expected to

volunteer a minimum of 12 hrs. per month. The volunteer hours can be made up through ride-alongs, training, community events, or emergency callouts. During 2022 the members of the Auxiliary Constable Program participated in the Special Olympics NHL Alumni game, Cram-a-Cruiser, and Cops & Kids Fishing Derby. It has been tough for members to get their 12 hour volunteer time because of COVID 19 restrictions. During 2022 814 hours were completed by our dedicated team. The members should be able to fulfill their volunteer hours for 2023 because most COVID-19 restrictions have been lifted or reduced and community events and ride-alongs are now becoming available for selection.

Other Investigations while assisting uniform patrol:

During the course of this quarter, investigations consisting of sudden death investigations as an acting Sergeant, traffic complaints, harassment, personal welfare checks, police assistance, and community services were conducted by Constable Verbeek.

In total, 74 Occurrences, 74 dispatches, 77 assignments, 76 reports, resulted in 3 total charges, 1 extra judicial measure for sexual assault, as a result of the victim's request, 2 charges of mischief – interfering with the lawful enjoyment of property, 1 weapons charge – weapon unauthorized possession.

Other community initiatives: Proactive

General patrols consisted of the morning, lunch break and afternoon. Each day if time and call volume permits a general school patrol in the parking lots and adjacent areas were conducted during arrival and departure of students. Foot patrols were conducted at lunch time on a rotating school basis. These patrols have proven to be deterrents for a number of issues, including, however not limited to, Criminal Code breaches and other statutes enforced by police. Further this provides staff and students a sense of security and community involvement.

Four formal presentations were conducted in a classroom setting with various topics covered. Fifteen impromptu presentations were conducted at the various high schools, including Eastside Secondary School, St. Theresa Secondary School, Nicholson Catholic College and Centennial Secondary School. The material consisted of a diverse array of topics ranging from general policing, cyber bullying, internet safety, as well as an open forum with a question and answer period.

Three Lockdown drills were conducted at this time.

March 16, 2023

Liaison with various community partners including, however not limited to, Belleville Youth Justice Committee, Safe Schools Advisory Board, Youth Referral Diversion program.

General patrol in hallways and surrounding school areas such as "smoking areas" was conducted at all Belleville high schools on a daily basis. This strengthens the relationship and rapport with students as well as it provides a uniform presence.

Weekly follow up meetings regarding ongoing investigations and liaising with administrators to receive updates regarding student behavior. Meetings regarding Community Threat Assessment Protocol development and status involving community partners.

Other assignments:

Constable Verbeek consistently assists platoon supervisors in an acting Sergeant role, which includes release of charged persons and other platoon duties, such as sudden death investigations, supervisor attendance. He has assisted platoons with calls for service during platoon training sessions, and has been assigned OIC desk duties.

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION: That the Board review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

You will note that the Court Services Section has been quite busy during the fourth quarter and further that the numbers remained quite consistent for this quarter.

Belleville Police Service Courts Services

The unit consists of police officers, special constables, and three civilian support staff, two full-time and one part-time, who maintain an office at the court facility.

Court Office


The Court Unit liaises with the Crown Attorney, Court Administrator, Provincial Prosecutors, Probation Office and Victim/Witness Services as well as other police and civilian agencies with a view to ensuring that police charges are properly prepared and processed through the courts. They are also responsible for providing service in relation to serving court-related documents, court appearances, bail hearings, trials, transfer of charges as well as maintaining accurate and timely records on Niche and CPIC. Members of the Unit are in frequent contact with a host of other police services and agencies such as the Judiciary, Defence Counsel, Court Administrative Staff, public and private agencies regarding victims and offenders as well as the general public. The Unit prepares Criminal Code information for charges stemming from court matters (i.e. failure to appear in court), prepares charges on behalf of the Probation Officer, and notifies and cancels witnesses as required. Additionally, the Unit ensures that Crown instructions for pending court proceedings are relayed to officers.


During the fourth quarter of 2022, 97 Criminal Code charges were processed and laid by the Court Office staff which is a 49% increase compared to the 65 charges laid in 2021.

What is a bail hearing?

If police do not release the person who has been arrested, they must bring the person before a justice for a bail hearing within 24 hours or as soon as possible. A bail hearing is a procedure where a Judge or a Justice of the Peace determines whether a person charged with an offence should be released or held in custody pending trial. On the appearance date, the accused may enter into a consent release situation whereby certain conditions are agreed upon and must be followed, elect to run a hearing to be released if there is no consent by the Crown for release, or ask that the hearing be adjourned in order to find a suitable surety to attend court to assist with the release conditions and supervising the accused.

During the fourth quarter of 2022, there were a total of 254 instances where an officer was required in court with regard to a bail hearing being scheduled, whether it was a first appearance or an additional appearance due to an adjournment, compared to 326 in 2021.





Court Security – Special Constables


Special Constables are civilian members who play an important role within the Belleville Police Service. Once hired, the Chief of Police swears in members as Peace Officers. Special Constable is a designation issued by the Province of Ontario providing members with a limited Law Enforcement role in the City of Belleville.

The Special Constables ensure the security of Justices, Judges, Justices of the Peace, court staff, all occupants of the courthouse, all persons taking part in or attending court proceedings, and the security of court buildings during the hours when the courts are operating. They provide professional care, custody, and transportation of people who are in custody from various detention facilities as well as anyone taken into custody during court proceedings. The unit escorts prisoners within the courthouse to ensure timely, safe and secure appearances in the required courtrooms.

Special Constables are responsible for fingerprinting and gathering DNA samples for the DNA Data Bank. Under the Canadian Criminal Code, Judges can order those convicted of designated offences to provide samples for DNA analysis. Young offenders can be included in the DNA Data Bank. The DNA Data Bank helps investigators identify suspects, link crime scenes where there are no suspects, eliminate suspects, and determine if a serial offender may be involved in a crime. DNA kits are prepared by the RCMP National DNA Data Bank and supplied to the Service. The Special Constable has to take the Offender's fingerprints and blood droplets for submission. They are also used for special events, subpoena service, ground searches, and any other duties assigned by the Supervisor to assist other units. The Unit completed 14 DNA court-ordered samples in the fourth quarter of 2022 compared to 17 DNA samples taken in the fourth quarter of 2021.

As part of the Court Security Plan, Special Constables staff the entrance of the courthouse to operate the magnetometer and x-ray machine in order to screen individuals entering the courthouse. They are looking for any items that may pose a security risk such as guns, knives, scissors, etc. If an item is found, the individual is given the option of removing it from the courthouse to allow entry or forfeiting it for destruction.




The following graphs indicate the number of persons screened during the fourth quarter of 2022 for a total 5,774 compared to 4,299 in 2021.



The Quinte Courthouse serves two Police Services, four OPP detachments and the Military Police within the County of Hastings: Belleville Police Service, Tyendinaga Police Service and the Military Police, Quinte West OPP, Centre Hastings OPP, North Hastings OPP and Prince Edward County OPP (for bail hearings only).

Prisoner transportation is shared between the Belleville Police Service and Quinte West OPP who supply two Special Constables to operate their prisoner transport vehicle. There is the requirement to attend at the Quinte Detention Centre (Napanee) in the morning to pick up prisoners and then to return the prisoners at the conclusion of court. On a weekly rotation basis, Belleville Police Service is responsible for either the morning transport or the afternoon.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners transported during the fourth quarter of 2022 for a total of 205 (86 in 2021) prisoners; 144 (72 in 2021) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 61 (14 in 2021) prisoners for the other services and OPP detachments.





Note: Quinte West, Centre Hastings, North Hastings and Prince Edward are OPP detachments.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled at the Quinte Courthouse. This is where a prisoner is arrested the day before or day of the court appearance. The prisoner is not transported on the escort wagon and would not be captured in the transportation stats. In this case, the prisoner would attend the courthouse to be housed, escorted to the courtroom, and released.

In the fourth quarter of 2022, the number of prisoners transported was 205 compared to 252 prisoners handled.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled during the fourth quarter of 2022 for a total of 252 (44 in 2021) prisoners; 174 (25 in 2021) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 78 (19 in 2021) for the other services and OPP detachments.

SUBJECT: CRIME STATISTICS – 4TH QUARTER REPORT 2022

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION: That the Board review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

You will note that in some areas we have seen a slight increase in criminal activities while in other areas you will see a decrease in a number of areas as well. It is important to recognize that individual crime trends on any given year will increase or decrease based on a series of factors. We believe that the recent organized crime investigation, Project Coyote will have an impact on our overall crime rates, however this may not be seen fully in 2023.

Total Crimes:

The total number of crimes reported during the fourth quarter of 2022 was 1001 (62 unfounded) for an actual of 939 "crimes" compared to 1090 crimes reported during the fourth quarter of 2021. This represents an 8% decrease in reported crimes. The clearance rate for 2022 was 52% compared to 63% clearance rate in 2021.

Homicides:

There were no homicides reported during the fourth quarter of 2022 or 2021. An arrest was made in December from the shooting incident last July at the Northway Restaurant. A 30-year-old male from Toronto was charged with 2nd Degree Murder.

Robberies:

There were 7 robberies (0 unfounded) with a clearance rate of 14% reported in the fourth quarter of 2022 compared to 6 robberies reported during the same time last year. This represents a 17% increase in robberies for the fourth quarter in 2022.

Break and Enters:

During the fourth quarter of 2022, there were 50 break and enters reported (2 unfounded) for an actual of 48 with a clearance rate of 23%. This is a 11% increase from the 45 break and enters (12 unfounded) reported in the fourth quarter of 2021 with a 30% clearance rate.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 31 reports of motor vehicle thefts (10 unfounded) for an actual of 21 during the fourth quarter of 2022 with a clearance rate of 10%. This represents a 107% increase in motor vehicle thefts compared to the 15 reports of motor vehicle thefts (3 unfounded) for the fourth quarter of 2021.

Assaults:

A total of 88 assaults (6 unfounded) were reported in the fourth quarter of 2022 for an actual of 82 with a clearance rate of 77% compared to 108 (9 unfounded) with an actual of 99 assaults reported for the same period in 2021. This represents a 19% decrease in reported assaults for 2022.

Sex Offences:

There were 24 sexual offences reported (2 unfounded) for an actual of 22 during the fourth quarter of 2022 with a clearance rate of 77%. This represents a 20% decrease compared to the 30 (2 unfounded) sexual offences reported during the same time period in 2021 with an 82% clearance rate.

Frauds:

There was a 7% increase in frauds reported for 2022. The fourth quarter reports indicate 63 frauds reported (1 unfounded) for an actual of 62 with a clearance rate of 26% compared to the 59 (5 unfounded) for an actual 54 incidents reported in 2021 with a 15% clearance rate.

Drug Offences:

There were 18 drug offences reported (0 unfounded) with an 89% clearance rate reported in this quarter. This is a 14% decrease from the 21 (1 unfounded) drug offences with a 90% clearance rate reported during the same time frame in 2021.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 28 criminal harassment incidents reported (1 unfounded) for an actual of 27 with a 78% clearance rate in the fourth quarter of 2022. This represents a 3% decrease compared to the 29 (7 unfounded) harassment incidents reported this time last year.

Utter Threats:

There were 33 incidents reported (3 unfounded) for an actual of 30 with a clearance rate of 93% during the fourth quarter of 2022. This represents a 39% decrease from the 54 (11 unfounded) incidents reported with a 91% clearance rate in the fourth quarter of 2021.

Arson:

There were 2 incidents of arson reported during the fourth quarter of 2022 with a 100% clearance rate. This is a 100% increase from the 1 incident of arson reported in the fourth quarter of 2021.

ViCLAS:

There was a total of 17 ViCLAS submissions for both **criteria** and **non-criteria** offences identified in the fourth quarter of 2022. This represents a 19% decrease from the 21 ViCLAS submissions for both criteria and non-criteria offences submitted in the fourth quarter of 2021.

- All 14 **criteria offences** were for Sexual Assaults and require mandatory ViCLAS submissions. Criminal charges have been laid on 2 sexual assault investigations and 9 sexual assault investigations are continuing.
- The 3 remaining **non-criteria offences** were for Luring, Suspicious Person and Attempt Abduction (charges were laid on the Luring incident).

Presentations/Training:



On October 20, 2022, Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey met with the "Unplugged" Youth Group (girls aged 10 to 13 years) at the St. George's Anglican church in Trenton and educated them on cyber safety.

On October 25, 2022, Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey attended the Correctional Service Canada, Warkworth Institution and spoke to correctional staff regarding High Risk Offenders and Sex Offenders housed at the Institution.

On November 17, 2022, Inspector Meeks, Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey, Detective Constable Bested along with a number of other female special constables and patrol officers participated in the 2nd annual "Women in Policing" event held at the Belleville Police Station. These dedicated female police officers participated in the numerous equipment demonstrations, presentations, and answered questions raised by the 35 female attendees interested in pursuing a career in policing.






Injury Type







SUBJECT: 2022 ANNUAL CALLS FOR SERVICE

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION: That the Board review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

In the first slide of the attached Annual Report for 2022 you will see that our service responded to **26,645** calls for service that were dispatched to our members. This does not account for the walk-in calls for service that are handled by our members at the front desk and from the stats completed a couple of years ago we believe our calls to be in the range of approximately **30,000**. The important consideration to comprehend is the fact that we saw a **9% increase** in calls for service in 2022 over 2021 which equates to **2180 more** dispatched calls for service in 2022 than in 2021.

As the attached charts shows, the increase of calls for service in the fourth quarter of 2022 compared to 2021 was 316 calls more in 2022 than in 2021. This denotes a **5% increase** of calls for service in this quarter alone.

In the fourth quarter of 2022 we again notice that the majority of calls for service are the 911 calls or 911 hang-up calls and due to our policies and procedures we must ensure that the caller is safe. These calls take up a lot of time and in 2024 I would like to seek funding to initiate a marketing campaign to look at a public awareness and education program for 911 hang-ups.

Some other areas of a significant increase were security screenings in the courthouse where we observed a **31% increase** which can be attributed to the COVID measures being rescinded.

We have also noted that there was a **27% increase** in the number of criminal record checks which again we believe is attributed to the COVID measures being relaxed.

When looking at the total number of crimes reported we see a **17% increase**. This is something that we are following closely and will in the very near future be utilizing a daily dashboard that will permit us to following these statistics much closer and to be in a position to address these issues on a much timelier basis.

There was a **50% decrease** in the number of homicides, but we also understand and appreciate that 2021 was an anomaly and these types of statistics need to be closely monitored to be properly understood.

You will note that we have seen a **40% increase in robbery calls** for service, while this is very significant, we believe that the recent events that transpired in Project Coyote, should help to alleviate some of these incidents moving forward.

When we have an issue with illicit drugs in our community we also see an uptick in the number of break and enters. In 2022 we observed a **34% increase** in the number of break and enter calls for service. These calls and activities will be closely monitored in the first and second quarter of this year.

In the area of motor vehicle thefts, we have seen a **100% increase** in the reported car theft. I am happy to report though that we were able to arrest two members of a known car theft ring from Montreal and subsequently in the fourth quarter of 2022 the car thefts dropped.

We have noted a **12% increase** in our assault calls for service and again we see a decrease in the fourth quarter of 2022.

As we noted in the third quarter of 2022, we saw an increase in the sex offence calls for service and overall for 2022 we observed an **17% increase** with respect to these criminal offences.

As our stats relate to fraud calls for service we have seen an **47% increase** from 2021 to 2022. We believe a large number of these frauds are attributed to the telephone and bank scams targeted at the elderly.

We are pleasantly surprised to note that we have a **12% decrease** in the drug related calls for service and Project Renewal has been working diligently on the drug trafficking trade in our Quinte region.

In 2022 we noted an **8% decrease** in the Utter Threats category and a **22% decrease** in the area of Arsons.

With the support of the Police Services Board, our increase in staffing will allow us to be in a better position in the third quarter of 2023 to initiate more proactive policing to address some of the concerns stated above. Currently the Belleville Police Service is in a reactive mode to policing issues due to staffing shortages.



Calls for Service (Total Occurrences)






Court Services Yearly and Quarterly Comparison

Bail Hearings Quarterly




Bail Hearings Monthly








Prisoner Transports Quarterly



Persons Arrested Day of or Previous Day
























Drugs Offences Quarterly 2020/2021/2022












Mental Health Calls for Service Yearly and Quarterly



SUBJECT: IN-TRUST ACCOUNT MANAGEMENT OF FUNDS

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION: That the Board review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

In accordance with procedure, ongoing audits and reviews of the two vaults of the Belleville Police Service are conducted throughout the year. As a result, in conjunction with members of the Police Disclosure and Quality Assurance Unit, efforts are made to re-allocate some of the funds based on court forfeiture orders, police reports or other orders of disposition. This includes reading numerous reports, liaising with the courts and cross-referencing several court documents in order to ascertain legal right and justification for the money.


From January 1st, 2022 to March 2nd, 2023, as a result of forfeiture orders in court, **\$93,717.88** was removed from the vaults and turned over to the Receiver General.

Section 132 and Section 133 of the Police Services Act regulates property that comes into the possession of a police force. Section 132 specifically addresses money that comes into the possession of a police force under Section 132(1) paragraphs 1 and 2, i.e. Abandoned, stolen, and/or seized by a member of a police force in the lawful execution of his or her duties. This section also outlines the circumstances of retention or disposal contingent on completed legal proceedings and no other court orders or legal requirements. In particular, Section 133(3) states, "if three months have elapsed after the day the money came into possession of the police force and the owner has not claimed it, **the Board may use it for any purpose that it considers in the public interest**".

As a result, numerous funds have met the conditions of Section 133(3) of the Police Services Act as no court orders or other legal requirements exist, at least three months have elapsed after the day the money came into the possession of the police and no owner(s) have claimed it. The incidents are varied and consist of







SUBJECT: NECESSITY FOR A BELLEVILLE DETOX CENTRE

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION: That the Board review and file for information.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

The attached article stresses the importance of a Belleville Detox Centre and the implications that could arise from the Police housing an intoxicated person by alcohol and or drugs. The purpose of this information is to draw attention to the importance of having this type of support facility in our community. The attached excerpt is from the CBC.

Death in police cell prompts call for better medical care for intoxicated prisoners (CBC)

'The care of intoxicated persons should not be a police responsibility': Independent Investigations Office.

The head of B.C.'s Independent Investigations Office (IIO) has issued a report calling on the government to make sure health professionals are available to all intoxicated prisoners after a man died when he was left to sober up in a police cell.

On April 23, 2022, Comox Valley RCMP arrested a man after he was reported trespassing in someone's yard in Courtenay, on Vancouver Island.

According to the IIO report, police officers said the man appeared to be intoxicated by drugs but was co-operative.

March 16, 2023

Police transported him to the RCMP detachment in Courtenay, where he was placed in custody for public intoxication. They did not charge him and planned to release him once he was sober.

The report says prisoner logbooks and CCTV footage show the man was checked on regularly and remained conscious and active for nearly eight hours.

Then he was found unconscious, transported to hospital and died the next day.

An autopsy found the man died from complications of acute alcohol withdrawal, with steatosis of the liver (fatty liver disease) also contributing.

The man was an alcoholic who, at the time of his death, had been trying to wean himself off alcohol with the help of medication.

'Raises concerns about how intoxicated prisoners are housed'

In his report, Chief Civilian Director Ron MacDonald said the involvement of guards and officers was "timely and appropriate" while the man was in their custody, and they didn't commit any offence that led to his death.

But he also said it's not the first time he has seen an intoxicated person die in custody, through no fault of police.

"I've seen many, many cases of individuals who are picked up by police for some form of intoxication, placed in cells and wind up dead," MacDonald told CBC in an interview.

"And I've found in many of those cases that the police did everything they're expected to do."

MacDonald said the incident raises concerns about how prisoners who are intoxicated are housed in B.C., and he noted that police officers and jail guards are not trained medical professionals.

In the report, MacDonald wrote that "jail cells are not the best place for such prisoners."

He called it an "outdated practice, and proven not to adequately guarantee their safety and health," and pointed out that other options already in place in some parts of B.C., such as sobering centres or jails and prisons that have health care professionals on-site.

"People who suffer from intoxication or substance issues often have underlying medical conditions — this is a health issue.

"Just because we've been doing it this way all the time doesn't mean it's the right way to do it," he added, noting that he believes many police agencies agree.

MacDonald called on the government to change the way intoxicated people are brought into custody and to make sure safer, health-based options are available across the province.

He says the practice of placing someone in a holding cell to sober up dates back to when most public intoxication was related to alcohol. Today, he says intoxication could be related to a number of different substances, all with different health implications.

MacDonald also added that smaller jails don't have the same capacity to hire medically trained staff as larger population centres such as Vancouver and Surrey.

"I'd like to see this become an important issue that's studied and that the best approach is taken that can be applied in the widest array of circumstances.

In an emailed statement to CBC, the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General said it was unable to comment on the IIO investigation and its findings.

The ministry said the government is "building a comprehensive system of treatment" that was non-existent six years ago and is working to create more space for sobering and assessment beds.

"These beds provide a short-term (typically less than 24 hours), safe place for people under the influence of substances," reads the statement. "Staff monitor symptoms of acute intoxication to help people stay safe."

The ministry says the beds are designed "to divert anyone at risk of withdrawal from emergency rooms and the criminal justice system and direct them to appropriate care," and there are currently 98 of them across the province.

INFORMATION FACTORS:

Approximately 3 years ago the Belleville Police Service commenced a working relationship with a company called GEOTAB. This company gathers electronic vehicle data from any given vehicle equipped with a transponder unit to the client via wireless technology.

Historically, GEOTAB has only worked with commercial vehicle operators, they were looking to get into the law enforcement community and we seized the opportunity to be the first in Ontario to work with them on this initiative. We gather all kinds of data including when the police vehicle lights were activated, vehicle speed, mileage, seat belt usage and vehicle location to name a few.

At the recent 2023 International I.T. Conference in February that was held in Orlando, Florida a video prominently displaying interviews with members of our service was featured on a TV screen at their booth. Further the keynote speaker, the owner of GEOTAB spoke about the great work being done by the Belleville Police Service. GEOTAB is so impressed by the way that we have leveraged this technology that they have nominated us for the 2023 International Association of Chiefs of Police award for Technology Innovation and Excellence. A very prestigious honour just to be nominated.
