CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

For the Board to review and commend the named officers.

At approximately 9:20 pm on July 8, 2024 officers Michelle Harper and Erik Fernandes responded to a report of a suicidal female in the area surrounding Zwick's Park. They quickly located a female sitting on a small concrete light post at the top of the Bay Bridge. The post was outside of the railing and the female's legs were dangling over the side. She was armed with a knife and would not let the officers some near her.

Constables Harper and Fernandes began to negotiate with her along with Constable Dodds who had arrived at the scene a few minutes later. Constable Cooke and A/S/Sgt. King also arrived on scene to assist joined by Crisis Negotiators Sgt. Johnson and Constable Stein who were called in to assume their roles as trained negotiators. Belleville Fire and Rescue also attended and staged a boat under the bridge as a precaution.

As negotiations continued Constable Cooke and A/S/Sgt. King, both members of the BPS Emergency Response Unit began to plan for a rescue in the event the female attempted to jump or fell after a prolonged period of sitting on the small platform. At approximately 11:18 pm almost two hours after the initial call was received, the female who was using a marijuana vape, dropped the knife in the water, put the vape in her pocket, and handed her phone to Constable Stein. The officers quickly determined that she was about to jump from the bridge and Constable Stein moved in and held her against the railing while the other officers secured her then pulled her over onto the bridge as she was resisting their efforts to help her. She was taken to hospital for treatment and was physically unharmed as a result of the ordeal.

The collective efforts of these officers in patiently negotiating with the female in crisis, formulating a rescue plan, and taking action when required ensure her safety and saved her from serious injury or death. It also highlights the team approach and professionalism required to ensure a positive outcome to these dynamic situations. It is worth noting that at the time of the incident Constable Harper had less than eight months on the job and Constable Fernandes had just over one year.

Please join me in presenting commendations to all of the involved officers in recognition of their outstanding service to our community.





Total Calls for Service Monthly Comparison





April 1, 2023 – June 30, 2023 April 1, 2024 – June 30, 2024


Top Ten Call Types April 1, 2023 - June 30, 2023

Total Crimes:

During the second quarter of 2024, there were 1174 crimes reported (107 unfounded) for an actual of 1067 "crimes" compared to the 1199 reported during the second quarter of 2023. This represents a 2% decrease in reported crimes.

Homicides / Attempt Murder:

There were 2 attempt murders, a manslaughter and a 2nd degree murder reported during the second quarter of 2024. Last year during the same time frame, there were no reports of attempt murders or homicides. This represents a 400% increase from 2023.

Weapons Offences:

The number of incidents involving offensive weapons reported in 2024 was 26 compared to 25 reported in 2023. This indicates a 4% increase in weapon calls.

Assault Peace Officer:

There were 6 reports of assault peace officer in the second quarter of 2024 compared to 4 reported in 2023. All 6 incidents resulted in charges being laid. This represents a 50% increase from last year.

Robberies:

There were 9 robberies reported in the second quarter of 2024 compared to 5 robberies reported in 2023. This is an 80% increase over last year.

Break and Enters:

The total number of break and enter incidents reported were 41 (3 unfounded) compared to 74 (5 unfounded) reported in 2023. This represents a 45% decrease in break and enters.

Motor Vehicle Thefts:

There were 18 stolen vehicles reported (3 unfounded) in the second quarter of 2024 compared to 23 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2023. This indicates a 22% decrease.

Assaults:

There were 100 assaults reported (5 unfounded) for an actual of 95 during the second quarter of 2024. In 2023, there were 95 assaults reported (13 unfounded) which represents a 5% increase.

Sex Offences:

A total of 36 sexual offences were reported (2 unfounded) for an actual of 34 during the second quarter of 2024. In 2023, there were 47 sexual offences reported (3 unfounded) resulting in a 23% decrease.

Frauds:

There were 80 frauds reported (7 unfounded) for an actual of 73 during the second quarter of 2024. In 2023, there were 101 frauds reported (5 unfounded) which signifies a 21% decrease.

Drug Offences:

There were 22 drug offences reported in the second quarter of 2024 compared to 19 reported in 2023. This represents a 16% increase.

Criminal Harassment:

There were 66 criminal harassment incidents reported (17 unfounded) for an actual of 49 in the second quarter of 2024. In 2023, there were only 38 criminal harassment complaints. This is a 74% increase over last year.

Utter Threats:

There were 55 incidents of uttering threats reported (11 unfounded) for an actual of 44 during the second quarter of 2024. This is a 12% increase in threat calls compared to the 49 (13 unfounded) reported in the second quarter of 2023.

Arson:

There were 2 reports of arson investigated in the second quarter of both 2023 and 2024.

ViCLAS (Violent Crime Linkage Analysis System):

A total of 20 ViCLAS submissions were submitted for both criteria and noncriteria offences in the second quarter of 2024. They were for the following offences:

2 submissions for homicides and 1 submission for an attempt murder with
 2 victims. A 30-year-old male was charged with 2nd degree murder for the

- one homicide, while the investigation is ongoing into the second homicide and attempt murder.
- 9 submissions were for sex assaults, 2 for luring, 1 for abduction, 1 for voyeurism, 1 for indecent act, 2 for suspicious persons and 1 for harassment.

The second quarter of 2023 had 25 ViCLAS submissions. This represents a 20% decrease.

Presentations/Training:

On April 24, 2024, Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey along with another BPS member and our Human Resources department attended the Quinte Sports & Wellness Centre for the Quinte Region Career Fair to promote Policing as a career. This event runs from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and is in partnership with Employment Services of Ontario, the Cities of Belleville and Quinte West. This event is typically held three times a year (fall, mid-winter and spring). It's a networking opportunity with leaders in multiple sectors to learn about employment opportunities in our community and to connect with recruiters looking to hire.

On June 11, 2024 Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey conducted a CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) audit for staff members at the Belleville City Hall.

On June 13, 2024 Detective Constable Earle-Dempsey conducted a CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) audit for staff members at the Belleville Public Library.

Discussion topics for the CPTED audit at both city locations included personal safety as well as security enhancements for the building that could be done to improve the overall safety of staff members. It was a comprehensive 2-hour presentation at each location with a follow up report submitted.

Belleville Police Service Courts Services

The unit consists of police officers, special constables, two full-time and one parttime civilian support staff, who maintain an office at the court facilities.

Court Office

The Court unit liaises with the Crown Attorney, Court Administrator, Provincial Prosecutors, Probation Office and Victim/Witness Services as well as other police and civilian agencies with a view of ensuring that police charges are properly prepared and processed through the courts. They are also responsible for providing service in relation to serving court-related documents, court appearances, bail hearings, trials, transfer of charges as well as maintaining accurate and timely records on Niche and CPIC. Members of the unit are in frequent contact with a host of other police services and agencies such as the Judiciary, Defence Counsel, Court Administrative Staff, public and private agencies regarding victims and offenders as well as the general public. The unit prepares Criminal Code information for charges stemming from court matters (i.e. failure to appear in court), prepares charges on behalf of the probation officer, and notifies and cancels witnesses as required. Additionally, the unit ensures that Crown instructions for pending court proceedings are relayed to officers.


During the second quarter of 2024, 55 Criminal Code charges were processed and laid by the Court office staff compared to 65 during 2023. This represents a 15% decrease in charges.

What is a bail hearing?

If police do not release the person who has been arrested, they must bring the person before a justice for a bail hearing within 24 hours or as soon as possible. A bail hearing is a procedure where a judge or a justice of the peace determines whether a person charged with an offence should be released or held in custody pending trial. On the appearance date, the accused may enter into a consent release situation whereby certain conditions are agreed upon and must be followed, elect to run a hearing to be released if there is no consent by the Crown for release, or ask that the hearing be adjourned in order to find a suitable surety to attend court to assist with the release conditions and supervising the accused.

During the second quarter of 2024, there were a total of 427 instances where an officer was required in court with regard to a bail hearing being scheduled, whether it was a first appearance or an additional appearance due to an adjournment, compared to 360 in 2023. This is a 19% increase from last year.





Court Security - Special Constables

Special Constables are civilian members who play an important role within the Belleville Police Service. Once hired, the Chief of Police swears in members as Peace Officers. Special Constable is a designation issued by the province of Ontario providing members with a limited Law Enforcement role in the City of Belleville.

The Special Constables ensure the security of Justices, Judges, Justices of the Peace, Court staff, all occupants of the courthouse, all persons taking part in or

attending court proceedings, and the security of court buildings during the hours when the courts are operating. They provide professional care, custody, and transportation of people who are in custody from various detention facilities as well as anyone taken into custody during court proceedings. The unit escorts prisoners within the courthouse to ensure timely, safe and secure appearances in the required courtrooms. They are also used for special events, subpoena service, ground searches, and any other duties assigned by the supervisor to assist other units.

Special Constables are responsible for fingerprinting and gathering DNA samples for the DNA Data Bank. Under the Canadian Criminal Code, judges can order those convicted of designated offences to provide samples for DNA analysis. Young offenders can be included in the DNA Data Bank. The DNA Data Bank helps investigators identify suspects, link crime scenes where there are no suspects, eliminate suspects, and determine if a serial offender may be involved in a crime. DNA kits are prepared by the RCMP National DNA Data Bank and supplied to the Service. The Special Constable has to take the offender's fingerprints and blood droplets for submission. The unit completed 19 DNA court-ordered samples in the second quarter of 2024, compared to 14 samples taken in the second quarter of 2023. This is a 36% increase from last year.

As part of the Court Security Plan, Special Constables staff the entrance of the courthouse to operate the magnetometer and x-ray machine in order to screen individuals entering the courthouse. They are looking for any items that may pose a security risk such as guns, knives, scissors, etc. If an item is found, the individual is given the option of removing it from the courthouse to allow entry or forfeiting it for destruction. There were no items seized during the second quarter of 2024 or 2023.


The following graphs indicate the number of persons screened during the second quarter of 2024 for a total 7,591 compared to 7,352 in 2023. This is a 3% increase.




The Quinte Courthouse serves two Police Services, four OPP detachments and the Military Police within the County of Hastings: Belleville Police Service, Tyendinaga Police Service, the Military Police, Quinte West OPP, Centre Hastings OPP, North Hastings OPP and Prince Edward County OPP (for bail hearings only).

Prisoner transportation is shared between the Belleville Police Service and Quinte West OPP who supply two Special Constables to operate their prisoner transport vehicle. There is the requirement to attend at the Quinte Detention Centre (Napanee) in the morning to pick up prisoners and then to return the prisoners at the conclusion of court. On a weekly rotation basis, Belleville Police Service is responsible for either the morning transport or the afternoon.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners transported during the second quarter of 2024 for a total of 387 (13% increase from 344 in 2023) prisoners; 261 (26% increase from 207 in 2023) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 126 (8% decrease from 137 in 2023) prisoners for the other services and OPP detachments.









The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled at the Quinte Courthouse. This is where a prisoner is arrested the day before or day of the court appearance. The prisoner is not transported on the escort wagon and would not be captured in the transportation stats. In this case, the prisoner would attend the courthouse to be housed, escorted to the courtroom, and released.

In the second quarter of 2024 the number of prisoners transported was 387 compared to 496 prisoners handled.

The following graphs indicate the number of prisoners handled during the second quarter of 2024 for a total of 496 (15% increase from 432 in 2023) prisoners; 327 (23% higher than 266 in 2023) Belleville Police Service prisoners, and 169 (2% higher than 166 in 2023) for the other services and OPP detachments.



The debriefs covered a variety of incidents, including: hostage rescue, armed bank robbery, mental health for officers, K9 integration in operations, and large area search after officer's murder. Crime Severity Index: Frequently Asked Questions

July 2024

What is the Crime Severity Index?

The Crime Severity Index is an area-based measure of police-reported crime that reflects the relative seriousness of individual offences and tracks changes in crime severity. It was first introduced in 2009 and was developed at the request of the policing community as a complementary crime measure and to address limitations of the conventional Crime Rate. It is available back to 1998.

It complements two other measures of crime: the police-reported Crime Rate, which measures the volume of crime, and self-reported victimization survey data, which measure Canadians' experiences of crime.

Three related Crime Severity Indexes exist, each summarizing different groupings of crime: one for overall crime, one for violent crime and one for non-violent crime. Other measures available include Indexes for police-reported youth accused and weighted clearance rates.

The CSI is not intended to be used or interpreted in isolation and is not a universal indicator of community crime and safety. It should always be considered within a broad community context, such as how many people live in the area, demographics, employment opportunities and wages, level of remoteness and service availability, among others.

What are the benefits of having another measure of crime?

Developing a comprehensive understanding of crime and public safety involves the combination of many sources of information, including for example, police-reported crime, courts and corrections data, police resourcing data, as well as survey data on self-reported victimization and perceptions of safety and trust in institutions. There is no single measure that can adequately summarize all of the information desired on the extent and characteristics of crime. Different approaches serve different purposes, yet together, they provide a more comprehensive picture of crime than any one approach alone.

The police-reported Crime Rate tells us about the volume of crime coming to the attention of the justice system. It is not a measure of all crime occurring in Canada. But, it adds to our understanding of police workload and demands on the justice system.

The victimization data, for the offence types included, tell us about Canadians' experiences of crime, whether or not they are reported to the police.

The Crime Severity Index provides a different way of looking at crime in Canada. It adds to our understanding of crime because it takes into account the relative seriousness of individual offences.

The conventional crime rate is calculated by adding up the number of crimes reported by police for a given period and geographical area and then dividing that total by the population count for the area. Therefore, each crime has the same impact on the crime rate—for example, one murder has the same impact as one theft.

Typically, more frequent but less serious crimes, such as mischief, minor thefts and disturbing the peace, have the largest impact on the crime rate. The crime rate is less effective at reflecting changes in less frequent but more serious crimes.

For the Crime Severity Index, each crime is assigned a weight depending on its seriousness and as such, serious crimes have more impact on fluctuations in the Index. For example, murder has a weight of over 8,200, while property theft has a weight of 29. Therefore, the impact of one murder on the CSI approximately 280 times greater than one property theft. Weights used in the Crime Severity Index range from 3 for possession of cannabis by a youth, to over 8,200 for murder.

For example, in 2016 for the overall Crime Severity Index, break-ins accounted for about one-quarter (23%) of the Index, compared with about 7% in the Crime Rate. On the other hand, mischief accounted for about 5% of the Index, instead of 10% in the rate.

In terms of the Violent Crime Severity Index in 2016, robberies accounted for about 22%, rather than just 6% in the Violent Crime Rate. However, common assault accounted for only 9%, instead of 41% in the violent crime rate. Homicide, a very serious and relatively low-volume offence, accounted for 10% of the Violent Crime Severity Index as opposed to 0.2% of the Violent Crime Rate.

How is the Crime Severity Index calculated and are the weights updated regularly?

The seriousness of each offence is determined by using standardized sentencing data from Canadian courts.

Each individual offence is "weighted" according to the severity of the sentences handed down by judges. Sentencing data come from both the adult and youth components of Statistics Canada's Integrated Criminal Court Survey (ICCS). Weights for the Index are based on the average of five years of courts sentencing data and they are updated every five years, using the most recent data available from the courts. It should be noted that outliers (atypically very long and unique sentences for a given offence) are not included in the average.

Weights are updated every five years to reflect recent sentencing practices and to account for any new *Criminal Code* offences. The CSI weights were updated for the third time with the release of 2022 data, and are applied back to the 2021 revised data and they will be applied to subsequent data releases moving forward until the next update to the weights (currently planned for 2027 data release). Updated weights are not used to revise historical crime statistics.

The release of 2012 data in 2013 marked the first year of UCR data requiring updated weights. The CSI weights were most recently adjusted in 2022 and applied retroactively to UCR data back to 2021 revised and are applicable to all subsequent data releases moving forward until the next update to the weights. The 2022 version of the weights are based on court data from 2015/2016 to 2019/2020.

To calculate the actual weight for an offence, the incarceration rate for that offence – that is, the percentage of all convictions receiving a jail sentence – is multiplied by the average length of the prison sentence in days.

Incarceration rates and average prison sentences are calculated at the national level using five years of courts data.

For example, using the 2022 CSI update figures:

Those weights are then multiplied against the volume of each offence to determine what their impact will be in the Crime Severity Index.

For example:

	Weight		Number of incidents		WEIGHTED TOTAL (Contribution to the Index)

Disturb the peace	12	×	104,733	=	1,256,796

The results are then totaled and divided by the population. The index is standardized to 100 nationally to facilitate comparisons. The base year is 2006.

In addition, three linkage factors are applied to data that use the updated weights (i.e. 2016 revised data and onwards) to ensure comparability of CSI values using the old and new weights (similar to the way factors are applied to spending amounts over time to ensure constant, comparable dollars that control for inflation).

What is the impact of the updated weights?

The Crime Severity Index is designed as a measure of the severity of police reported crime. If a change is made to the seriousness of a particular crime, by the introduction of a mandatory minimum sentence or other legislative change, it will and should be reflected in the Crime Severity Index at the next regular revision of weights.

However, the degree to which the Crime Severity Index is affected by new legislation alone is not significant. To see a significant impact on the Index, a large change in both the volume of an offence and the weight of an offence would have to occur at the same time.

Due to their volume and severity, the top five contributors to the national Crime Severity Index are breaking and entering, fraud, robbery, sexual assault level 1 and mischief. With the updated 2022 weights, robbery and sexual assault level 1 are contributing more to the overall

Crime Severity Index than with the previous weights, and breaking and entering, fraud and mischief are contributing less.

For the Violent Crime Severity Index, the top five contributors are robbery, sexual assault level 1, assault level 2, assault level 1, and uttering threats to a person. With the new 2022 weights, robbery and sexual assault level 1 have a greater contribution to the Violent Crime Severity Index than with the previous weights. Assault level 2, assault level 1 and uttering threats have a lesser contribution than with the previous weights.

What can the Crime Severity Index be used for?

The index gives us a different view of crime and allows us to answer questions that were not easily answerable previously, such as: Is police reported crime in Canada more serious than it was last year? Has police reported crime become more serious over time? And, when controlling for the unique circumstances of each area—such as how many people live in the area, demographics, employment opportunities and wages, level of remoteness and service availability, among others—Is police reported crime in my jurisdiction more or less serious than in another jurisdiction?

What does the Crime Severity Index tell us?

The Crime Severity Index tells us if police-reported crime was relatively more or less serious, based on the total weight distribution attributed to police-reported crime, than in previous years based on the distribution of total weights assigned to police-reported crimes. For ease of interpretation, the index is converted to 100 for the base year, which is 2006.

For jurisdictions, the Crime Severity Index is particularly useful in determining if police reported crime has become more or less serious over time, or—when controlling for demographic, geographic, social and economic characteristics—if police reported crime is more or less serious in one area than another.

An example of how a jurisdiction can compare itself to Canada:

In 2006, Canada's Index is 100. If Province X has an Index of 113, Then, compared to Canada overall, Province X's police reported crime is more serious by 13%.

A jurisdiction can also use the Crime Severity Index to determine if its own police reported crime has become more or less serious over time:

Province X has an Index of 113. Five years ago, its Index was at 122. So, crime severity in Province X has decreased by 7% over the past 5 years.

The Crime Severity Index can also be used to compare the level of crime severity in one jurisdiction to the level of crime severity in another jurisdiction, in a given year:

Province X has an Index of 113.

In the same year, Province Y has an Index of 85.

So, crime severity in Province X is 33% higher than in Province Y.

Of utmost importance is adequately contextualizing any comparison. We can interpret changes in the CSI within the context of other indicators. The CSI is not intended to be used in isolation and is not a universal indicator of community crime and safety. It should always be considered within a broad community context.

What is the jurisdictional impact of the index?

The value of the index in a given jurisdiction is determined by its mix of crimes; the higher the proportion of serious crimes in a jurisdiction, the higher the index.

Let's say that two jurisdictions, Province A and Province B, have roughly the same populations and number of crimes. These areas will have the same crime rate. Their Index values will differ, however, depending on their mix of crimes. For example, if Province A experiences mostly less-serious, and hence lower-weighted, crimes such as disturbing the peace and mischief, their Index value will be quite low. If Province B experiences mostly serious, higher-weighted offences, such as homicides, break-ins and robberies, their Index value will be higher.

Further, less-serious crimes, such as disturbing the peace and mischief, tend to be subject to reporting differences both by the public and by the police in various jurisdictions. The Crime Severity Index decreases the impact that these less-serious crimes have on trends.

Who was involved in the development of the Crime Severity Index?

The index was created by the Canadian Centre for Justice and Community Safety Statistics at Statistics Canada in collaboration with numerous engagement partners. Representatives from provincial and federal justice departments as well as the policing and academic communities sat on a Working Group to guide the development of the Index.

Specifically, the Working Group was made up of members from the following organisations:

- · Statistics Canada: CCJCSS UCR Survey and Courts Survey staff, methodologists
- <u>Police Services</u>: RCMP, OPP, Sûreté du Québec, Royal Newfoundland Constabulary, Toronto, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Victoria and Saint John
- <u>Federal/provincial Justice Liaison Officers</u>: Justice Canada, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and Alberta
 - · Academics: Universities of Ottawa, Waterloo and Manitoba

Do the weights take into consideration "time served" in remand?

The length of time served in remand is not available from the Courts Survey, and therefore cannot be accounted for in the Crime Index weights. However, it is known to be a factor in sentencing.

SUBJECT: Property Storage Report

CHIEF'S RECOMMENDATION:

For the Board to review and file for information.

The Belleville Police Service has a significant issue with a lack of space to house the various categories of property that come into our possession. When our headquarters was built approximately 5000 square feet was cut from the consultant's recommended footprint as a cost cutting measure. The bulk of that space was removed from the property storage portions of the building prior to construction.

As a result of this decision we are now at the point where we have run out of space necessitating the purchase of storage containers as well as paying for off site storage rental units. The attached report submitted by Inspector Rene Aubertin details the issues we currently face with property retention and lists potential solutions. In the long term a storage building will need to be constructed on the property at 459 Sidney Street. A quote for the construction of an 80'X60" building was recently received at a projected cost of \$2,764,000. This was cut from our 2025 Capital Budget but was included in our 10 year capital plan for future consideration.

Belleville Police Service Storage Issues

The Belleville Police Service has two major storage issues. The first is related to Property Storage and the second is related to Fleet and Facility Storage. Both are drastically lacking in this building. As such we have 4 shipping containers on our property and continue to pay for off-site storage. The Shipping containers are unsightly and impractical to have anyone work in for more than a few minutes. The off-site storage is expensive.

This report will look at the issues related to our lack of storage.

PROPERTY STORAGE

First, what is "property" in the context of the Belleville Police Service?

Property consists of all seized or recovered items of evidence required for court purposes, all found, surrendered items, or items turned over to the police. This also includes personal effects and property found on an arrested person who is being held in custody. Property can be as simple as a found wallet or purse or can be a toxic illegal drug like fentanyl seized in a drug raid or from an arrested person. Property can be biological samples taken from a victim of a crime that needs to be secured in climate-controlled fridges or freezers or can be firearms and ammunition surrendered to police or seized as a result of a crime. In essence, property can be anything.

The Belleville Police Services Property area consists of a main storage area, a Drug Vault, a Firearms Vault, a DNA Vault, a Cash Vault, and a shipping container.

The next consideration when talking about property is the legal requirements for retention. The Service is required to keep secure continuity of property under several different legislations including the Criminal Code of Canada, Case Law, Community Safety and Policing Act, as well as the service's own policies, procedures, and retention bylaws.

When the Belleville Police Service Headquarters moved from 93 Dundas Street East to 459 Sidney Street in October 2020, the process of moving all of the property was a massive undertaking. This move took several months of preparation and work by a team of members of the service. First, members conducted an audit to ensure the accuracy of items in the custody of the service. Next, the team worked on disposing of property that could be legally disposed of using the legal means available. Once this was completed, all property was boxed and labeled, logged out of 93 Dundas Street East, transported to 459 Sidney Street, and logged back into the new property room.

The issues that the current property room is facing are similar to those that have plagued our service and all police services for decades....space. The current property team consists of two full-time civilian members who report to the Staff Sergeant of Police Disclosure and Quality Assurance. The staff does a remarkable job of organizing and keeping track of all of the property in our custody. As has been evidenced by multiple reports to the board, our call volume to the service is ever-increasing. As such, so is the volume of property that is required to be held by the service.

What are the major issues facing the property unit currently and what are some of the solutions we are working on;

- 1) Space
- 2) Volume of Prisoner Property
- 3) Old technology/transfer to new technology

Space

The footprint of the Property Unit is just not big enough to keep up with the demands of the unit. Our space is becoming more and more limited as noted in the below pictures;







Since moving into 459 Sidney Street, the service has added a number of external storage solutions to accommodate: two forty-foot shipping containers and two twenty-foot shipping containers. One forty-foot was added for property to accommodate the storage of bicycles and other large items. A twenty-foot container was added for the sole purpose of storage for one joint forces operation.

The forty-foot property container is overflowing with bikes, e-bikes, and mobility scooters and is beyond capacity. The working conditions in the shipping container can be hazardous as it is dark, overcrowded, occasionally slippery, seasonally hot or cold, and smells strongly of gas. This is dangerous when lifting and moving tangled, damaged, and heavy bikes.





When our shipping container is full, we resort to finding other locations to store large items. We have had to house items such as ATVs in the garage with other service vehicles. We have also used the loading dock at the service as overflow pictured below. This causes issues with our maintenance staff and keeping their areas clear for their work.



The other space limitations concern the storage of items that may contain flammable liquids such as chainsaws or other tools. The service installed two external storage sheds to accommodate these items;



Unfortunately, these storage units are full or too small to handle some of the items we receive. One example is from one seizure of recovered tools pictured below.



We have, and continue to work on solutions to these issues. We have joined "Gov Deals", an online auction site that deals with government entities to help sell items with value. In the past, we have stored up items and then had a spring and fall auction. This resulted in the need to have several off-site storage locations that had monthly fees. The auctions have eliminated the need for some storage locations but the manpower required to keep on top of listing the items on the site and then arranging for pick-up of the items has put a strain on staffing to keep up. Additionally, while bikes can be sold at auction after 30 days, all other items including e-bikes, scooters, strollers, chainsaws, tools, and suitcases can only be sold (or disposed of as appropriate) after 90 days. This takes up approximately seven shelves and floor space in the storage room, and a majority of the shipping container.

Further, Gov Deals is a solution only for those items that are found, or abandoned. Items that were listed as evidence are required to be held until the case is complete. Sometimes these can take years to make their way through the court process and we have to keep the items stored. For example, there are an increasing number of MCM (Major Case Management) cases, the property of which is often contained in several 2x2x2 boxes, that we are required to maintain for 25+ years. Officer notebooks are also considered evidence, must be kept until fifteen years after the officer retires, and currently take up approximately thirty shelves.

Prisoner Property

Prisoner property has become a very complex problem. Historically when a person is arrested and held in custody, they may be in possession of a few personal items and possibly some seasonal clothing such as jackets. These items are stored and transported with the prisoner to court and eventually to a provincial jail if held in custody. With the homelessness crisis in our community, we have seen an increase in members of the homeless community coming into custody. When this happens, they are in many cases in possession of all of their worldly belongings. Court rulings and Human Rights Complaints across the province have held that police cannot just abandon a person's worldly possessions because they are homeless and are taken into custody. Police are required to handle the property as they would in any other circumstance and hold it per police procedures. In our case, we are required to hold the property for 30 days. Corrections facilities will not accept this volume of property and limit the items we can send with a prisoner to one small bag smaller than a backpack.

We have made many changes in this process in an effort to have a friend or family member come pick up the property and ensure that the accused sign a Prisoner Property Retention form ensuring they are aware that they have 30 days to address their property or it can be disposed of. This is still causing stress on the storage capabilities of the property unit for storage space and, if the retention form is not signed, the property is currently kept indefinitely. Many of the homeless community have bikes with trailers, shopping carts, or such vessels full of property, bags, tents, and cooking supplies. A couple of examples are pictured below;



The follow-up problem with some of these items is biohazard. We have had to adapt and have had to bag all items as we have ended up with bed bugs and other concerns from some of this property.

We have been working diligently with our officers to encourage them to find alternate solutions rather than bringing in large amounts of property with the accused, but it is unavoidable in many cases.

Old technology/transfer to new technology

As technology has evolved, our physical storage for some items such as video storage has and will continue to decrease. VHS tapes have given way to DVD which has now become digital and even cloud-based storage in some cases. With that said, the service is still in possession of thousands of VHS tapes from cases that are complete or unsolved. These need to be retained. We have been working for several years to convert all our VHS tapes to DVD and now to a digital file on BPS servers. This is a slow process as technology only allows for conversion to take place at the same rate as the video. For example, a two-hour video takes 2 hours to transfer from VHS to DVD. Once the process is complete the digital files will take up no physical space. Unfortunately, our next issue has become how to properly dispose of the VHS tapes with the data on them completely removed. Currently, we are exploring magnetic options, but for now, VHS tapes are physically dismantled, and the tape itself and cut into pieces to ensure it cannot be viewed. This is time-consuming and has delayed the availability of us to gain space back from the stored VHS tapes.

In conclusion, the BPS Property Unit is currently operating beyond its capacity. The solutions we are currently working on do provide some temporary relief, however, the reality is we continue to be short on space and a more permanent solution is required.

Fleet and Facility Storage

Fleet and facility storage has also been a problem since we moved into the station. The amount of equipment required to maintain this property has grown well beyond what was needed at the old station and the place to store it is limited. Further, as the fleet has grown, so it the requirement for storage of vehicle parts and accessories. I will explain further below.

Property Maintenance is a much larger undertaking since our move to the new station. Our fleet and facility team have two riding lawn mowers, two push mowers, two snow blowers, a power sweeper, and many other accessories to complete the property maintenance required for this site. Currently, all of this equipment is stored in a forty-foot shipping container and a second twenty-foot container.

Fleet Storage issues are complex in policing. When a new cruiser is purchased, the rear seat and backrest as well as the rear door panels are removed to make way for a prisoner cage that is secure and easy to clean and hose out. As well in many cases, center consoles of vehicles are required to be removed to make way for all of the computer and electronic equipment that is required in modern police vehicles.



These items need to be stored for between 3-5 years until the vehicle's useful police life has expired. Then, all of the police equipment is removed and the original equipment is replaced before sale. The replacement of these items greatly increases the value of the vehicle when it is auctioned off which offsets the cost of the police vehicles and upfitting.

Currently, all of the items removed from vehicles are stored in an offsite third-party storage facility which costs the service \$733.00 monthly which is \$8796.00 annually.

Solutions

The Service has looked at options in the past. The long-term solution would be to build a dual-purpose building on-site that could store long-term property items as well as bikes and large items. This building could also house all maintenance equipment and fleet items. The size of the building would be a minimum of 60x80 feet. The building would have two sides, one very secure for property storage and the other side for fleet and facility storage. The cost has been explored over the last couple of years with a range from 1.5 to 2.5 million dollars to have a building that is secure and climate-controlled. This is required for the storage of property and evidence items.

There are short-term solutions available but they have their own set of concerns and costs.

Short-Term Property Solutions;

We can get by in the very short term, however, within the next year, we will likely need another shipping container. We also need to add some storage solutions in the container we currently use for bikes and large items storage to assist with better use of the space. The addition of another container for the Property would alleviate some pressure inside the building. Only items that can withstand temperature changes would be able to be stored outside. This would have to be a very selective process with a policy in place to ensure nothing is damaged or continuity issues are addressed.

Fleet and Facility Solutions;

Another shipping container for Fleet and Facility would alleviate the need for the offsite storage and is almost cost neutral with the cost of a forty-foot shipping container roughly the cost of one year's off-site storage fees. The cost of another storage container for the property

Issues with shipping containers in general;

Shipping containers cause another issue on the property. We already have four storage units on our property. These are all located on the east side of the building. We are going to have issues if we add more storage containers to that location as we are going to be encroaching on the forensics garage access on the same side of the building. Regularly, tow trucks are in and out of that bay with vehicles from crime scenes and they will begin to have difficulty accessing that bay door. Adding more shipping containers will require us to look at another location on the property to keep those containers. Some locations have been explored such as further south on the east side of the property. This solution would require other expenses such as leveling of the ground and the addition of gravel to support the containers on a flat area. It would also require ramps to access the area over the current curbs to get into the containers. These costs will need to be explored further.
