- a) Downtown Community Office Report Mr. O'Brien noted that it is encouraging that the Downtown office is effective, and well equipped.
- b) Verified Alarm Response Program (VARP) Report Mr. O'Brien noted the trend in the VARP statistics is very encouraging.
- c) Financial Statements Q1 2025 Capital
- d) Court Security & Prisoner Transport Grant Yearly Summary Mr O'Brien commented the gap between costs and funding is getting wider: the provincial funding has not changed in ten years but costs have increased. Chair Smith remarked that a letter sent on April 1st to Minister Kerzner has had no response. Chief Rodd further added that the municipality bears the cost for the court service, with no ability to impact costs.
- e) Overtime Analysis Q1 2025 Director Ringham identified the significant strategic work to reduce overtime. Mr O'Brien commented the impact on this line in budgeting discussions, further remarking a decline in overtime costs is encouraging. Chair Smith agreed, remarking the trend is in the right direction. Chair Smith also noted the unpredictable nature of overtime. subject to forces that are outside of the control of BPS.
- f) Financial Statements Q1 2025 Operating Director Ringham gave an overview of this report as an opener to further highlight the risk outlined in the Contribution to Reserve Report.
- g) Contribution to Reserve Director Ringham presented a picture of the past, present and future for the Service, with special emphasis on the growing deficit in the Contribution to Reserve account. A high future estimate would be up to \$9.5 million and a low future estimate would be \$3.8 million deficit. There is a continued need to prioritize and resolve this issue.
- h) 2024 Financial Statements Operating
- i) IMPACT and HealthIM Annual Summary 2024
- i) Victim Services Annual Report 2024 Deputy Chief Meeks provided an overview to highlight the information provided in this report. The embedded service worker within BPS has been a valuable asset to the team and to the community. Victim Services are a core function of policing and the loss of funding will have an impact. The person is still working in that role as other opportunities for funding are sought. Mr O'Brien expressed his thanks to Deputy Chief Meeks for this information.
- k) Strategic Plan Update Vice Chair Enright Miller emphasized the collaborative nature of the work done thus far towards the Strategic Plan. The goal is to share the completed plan in fall of 2025. Options include presenting it during the October Board Meeting, or during a dedicated community session.

Information Factors:

1. Background

The Missing Persons Act, 2018 came into effect on July 1, 2019.

In accordance with O.Reg. 182/19 under the Missing Persons Act, 2018, each police service is required to annually prepare and report on Urgent Demands. This report shall be presented by April 1st of each year, after which, the Police Service Board shall make this information publicly available by June 1st of each year.

As per section 8(1) of the Missing Persons Act, 2018, the report shall contain:

- (a) the total number of urgent demands made in that year and the number of missing persons investigations to which they related;
- (b) a description of the types of records specified in the urgent demands made in that year; and
- (c) any other prescribed information.

An urgent demand is described as an "Emergency Demand for Records". This form allows law enforcement to urgently request specific records related to a missing person investigation when they have reasonable grounds to believe the person may be in danger. A form 5 is used in situations where waiting for a standard court order to access records would be impractical or dangerous, given the circumstances of the missing person's disappearance. The types of records that can be requested in a form 5 are; Contact and identification information, Telephone and electronic communication records (including cell phone data, internet browsing history, etc.), Global Positioning System (GPS) tracking data and Video records (like CCTV footage).

2. Findings

No Defined System of Data Collection

The Ministry did not create a system or method of data collection in order to meet this requirement, and it was left to each police service to develop a system that would allow them to record this reportable data.



During a provincial working group teleconference, recommendations have been made to the Ministry by police services to develop an electronic data collection system but this has not transpired. At this time, data recording and reporting remains with individual police services

Belleville Police Service – Data Reporting Process Difficulties

The Belleville Police Service has had difficulty completing a thorough report per the guidelines as there is no standard or process available but we have been meeting our obligation by submitting the report annually. To obtain a more accurate and comprehensive report moving forward, Belleville Police Service established a process in 2024 with our Communications Centre staff that will track any time an officer makes an Urgent Demand of a cell phone provider for a ping or any other information. This will provide a much clearer picture of its use in 2025. Furthermore, our designated Missing Persons Coordinator of the Criminal Investigations unit is now tracking all uses of Urgent Demands from all other providers such as banks, internet providers and social media sites as these cases would involve a detective from the Criminal Investigations Unit.

A copy of the 2024 Missing Persons report submitted to the Ministry is attached.






Non-Criminal Calls for Service








Criminal Calls for Service



During the first quarter of 2025, 78 Criminal Code charges were processed and laid by the Court office staff. This is 33% of the 240 charges laid during 2024.



Court Ordered DNA Samples Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total




Items Seized at Quinte Court House

Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total




Security Screenings at Quinte Court House

Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total






Prisoners Transported Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total



Persons Handled Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total












Collisions Involving FTR



Traffic Safety Unit Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total




Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total




Traffic Safety Unit Charges

Quarter 1 Volume Over Five Years






Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total








The K9 Unit completes daily training while not required for patrol duties. Both members also attend all ERU training days. Both members also attend training sessions with their training group from other services.






Fraud Q1 Comparison to Previous Annual Total



Information Factors:

This report is a comparison of 1st quarter statistics after the implementation of the new Verified Alarm Response Program that was implemented in January 2025.

In 2024, the total alarm calls generated were 883. In the first quarter (January 1st to April 30th) 285 alarm calls were generated of which, 66 were "single hit" triggers that generated a need for police response.

In the first quarter of 2025 (January 1st – April 30th), a total of 177 alarm calls were received, of which 34 were "single hit" triggers that we DID NOT respond to per the new alarm policy.

It should be noted that there may be occasions where the Alarm Company cancelled an alarm prior to our dispatch or arrival.




Volume of Alarm Calls
