Key Insights:

Detective Constable Stephanie Bested is a member of our Criminal Investigations Division and our Intimate Partner Violence Coordinator.

In February 2026, a request was made by two investigators of the South Simcoe Police Service to locate a vulnerable individual. The individual needed to be served with a subpoena for an upcoming trial pertaining to a project-level investigation.

On February 25th, 2026, Detective Sergeant Andrew Smith of the South Simcoe Police Service sent an email to our service commending the actions of Detective Constable Bested. Detective Sergeant Smith stated,

“D/Cst Bested went out of her way to my CAP investigators by compiling information from local records that showed locations in Belleville that were frequented by the individual. She even reviewed Body Worn Camera footage from recent interactions so an accurate description of their clothing could be obtained.”

Due to D/Cst Bested’s attention to detail and thoroughness, the investigators from South Simcoe were able to locate the individual within 60 minutes of arriving in the City of Belleville, serve the subpoena, connect the individual with assistance and future communications with the South Simcoe investigators. Detective Sergeant Smith recognized that this was not a usual undertaking by an officer, as Detective Constable Bested, like many others, had multiple tasks and investigations that required her attention.

D/Cst Stephanie Bested is to be commended for her collaborative teamwork in going above and beyond for another service, its members and the individual who required assistance. Stephanie recognized the importance of this request to a criminal investigation process and assisted another police service in both efficiency and effectiveness.

I hereby commend D/Cst Stephanie Bested for recognizing the importance of policing partnerships and collaborative safety and well-being, regardless of the community we are serving.

This milestone is one that should be recognized in partnership with our community reflecting their ongoing support and dedication to our municipal police service.

Our committee is planning a closed ceremony to honour the historical impact of our service, with distinguished guests in attendance. Given the time of year, weather remains an important consideration to ensure the event proceeds safely and without interruption.

To support the success of the ceremony, the Service will require funding to secure temporary event infrastructure appropriate for outdoor conditions. These facilities will ensure that all attendees are accommodated comfortably and that the ceremony can continue regardless of weather-related challenges.

- Reduces risk of discussing or voting on items without the required seven-day notice.
- Ensures future budget discussions and decisions occur in open session, increasing transparency.
- Guests and presenters can leave after the general session instead of waiting.
- The Board Administrator does not need to leave early to prepare for the open session, improving workflow.

Cons

- If the general session runs long, in-camera items may be rushed or lengthen the meeting.
- Guests may perceive a lack of transparency when the board moves in-camera right afterward.
- Pressure to end the meeting may cause in-camera discussions to be hurried due to other commitments.
- Longer overall meetings can be more difficult to manage.
- Board members may experience meeting fatigue, reducing the quality of confidential discussions.
- Some items may face a one-month delay before being placed on a future general session agenda.
- Media inquiries after the open session may postpone the start of in-camera discussions.
- Clearing the meeting space (JFO) may also delay the start of the in-camera portion.

Quarter 4 Volume Over Five Years



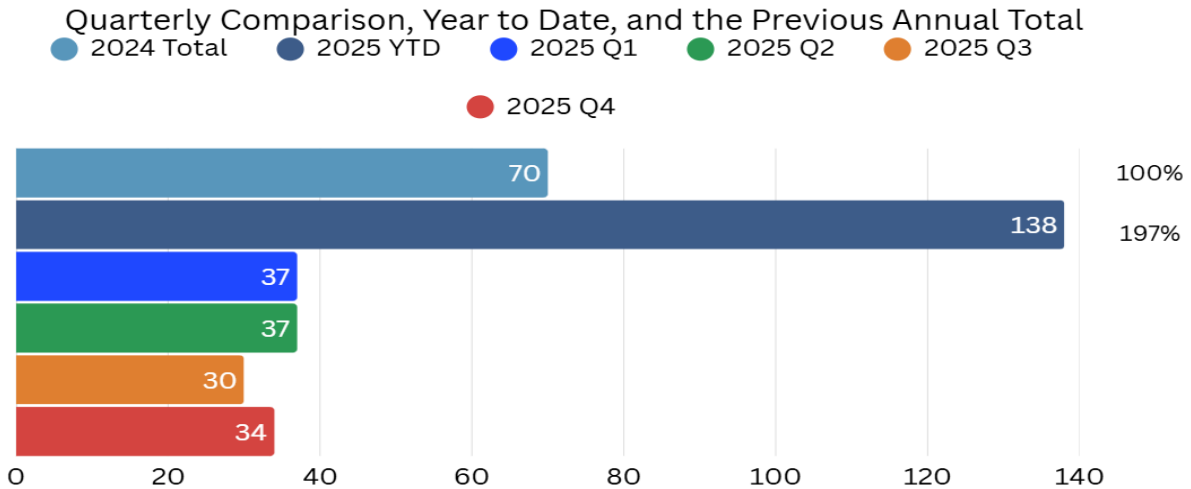

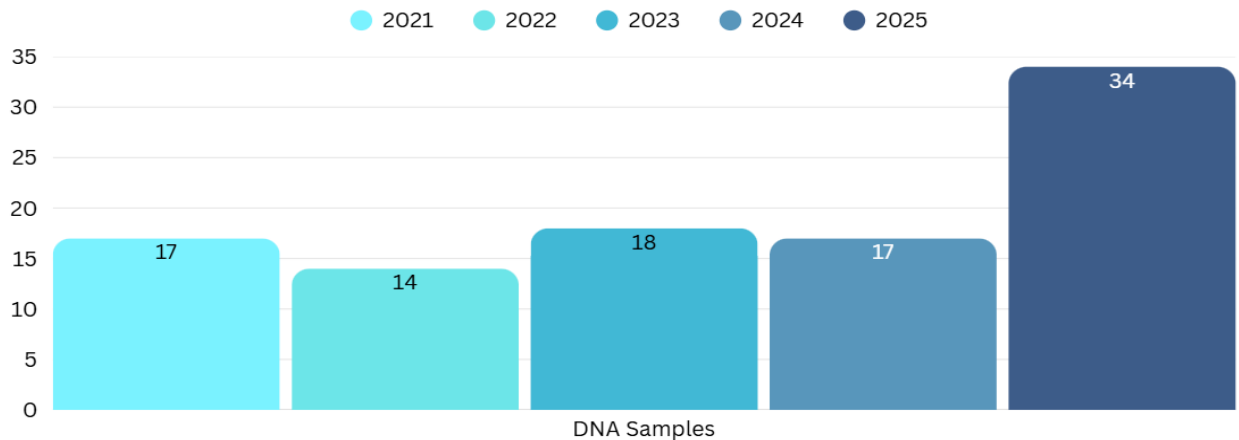

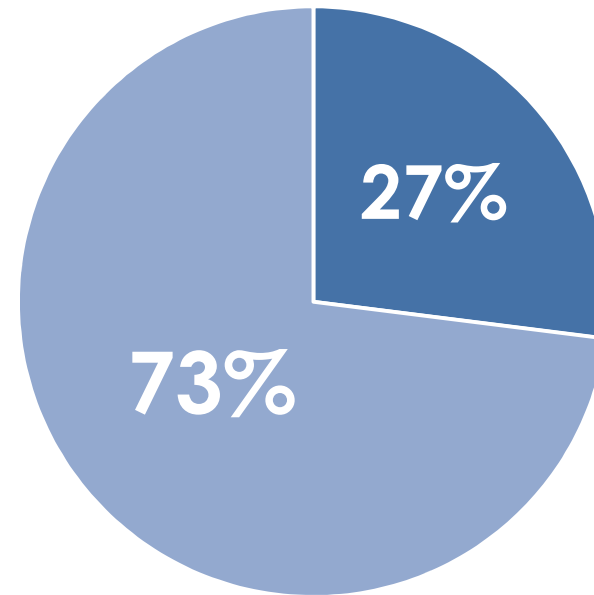

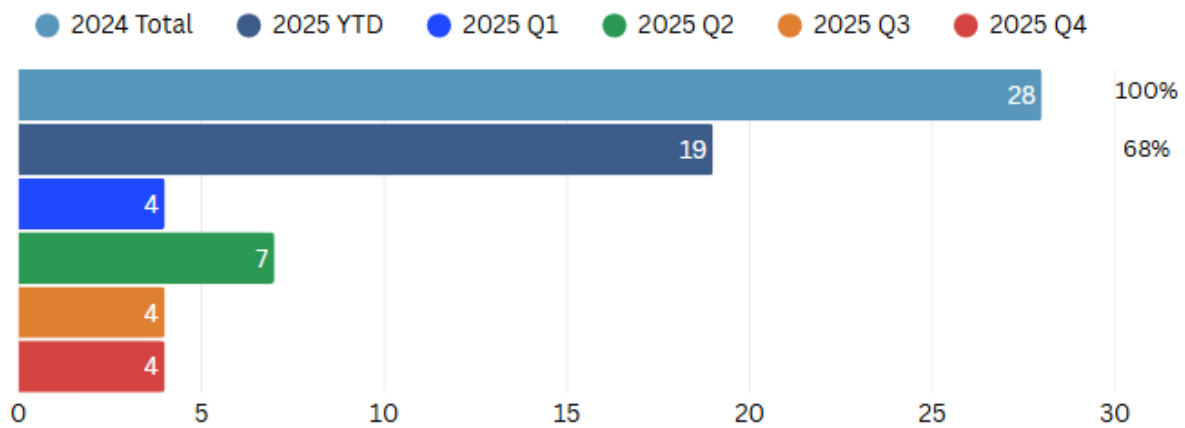

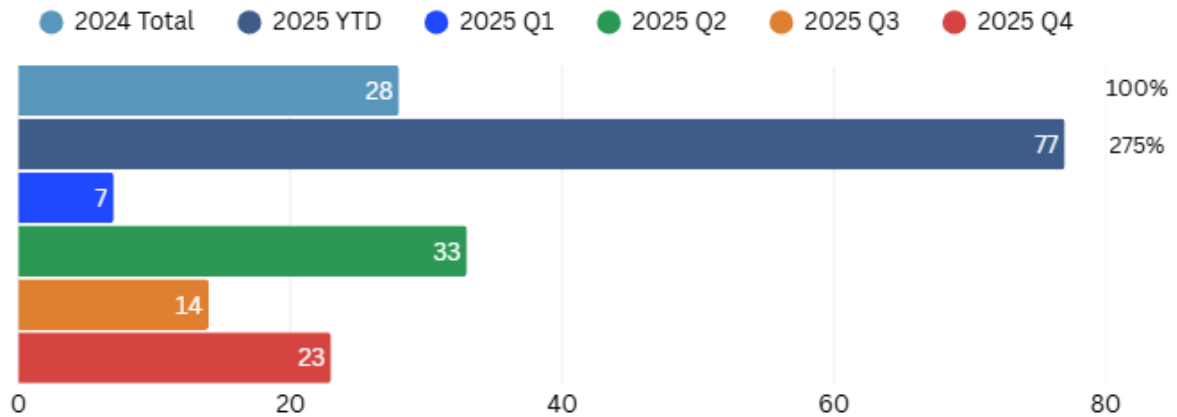

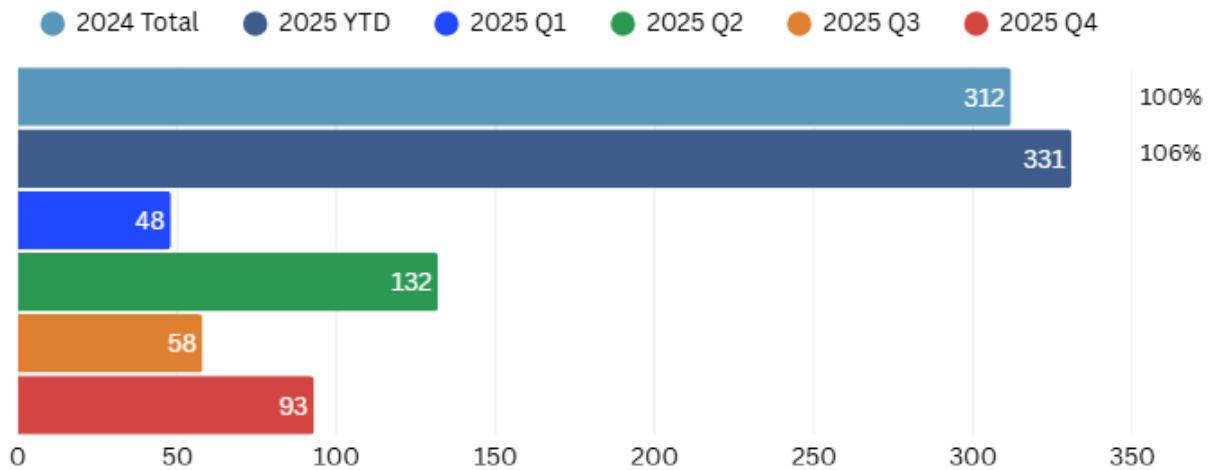

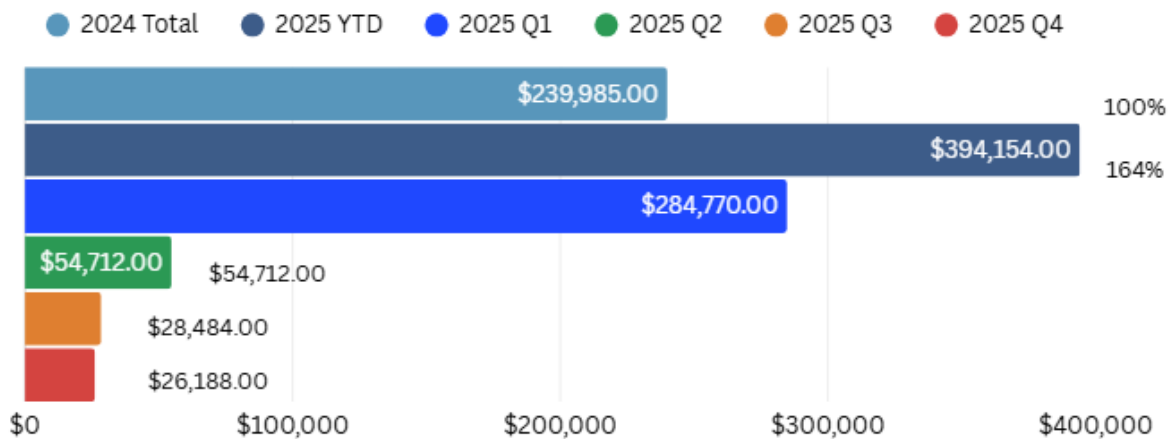

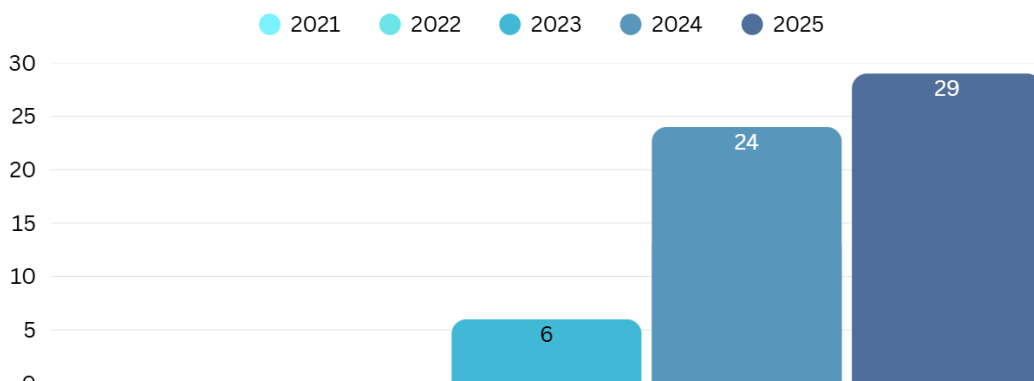
Unit Deployment

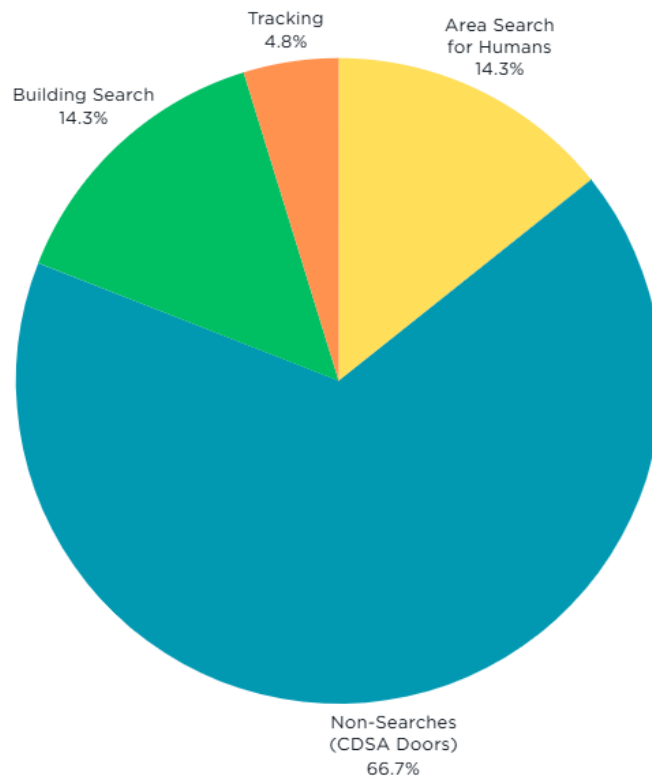

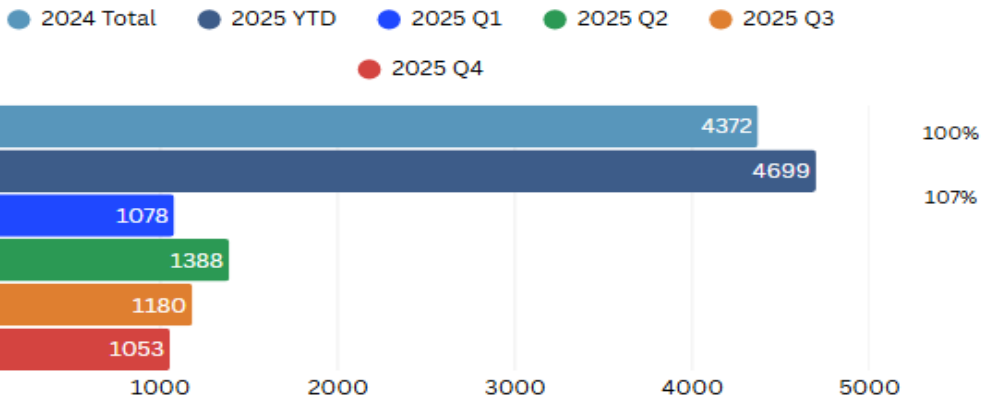

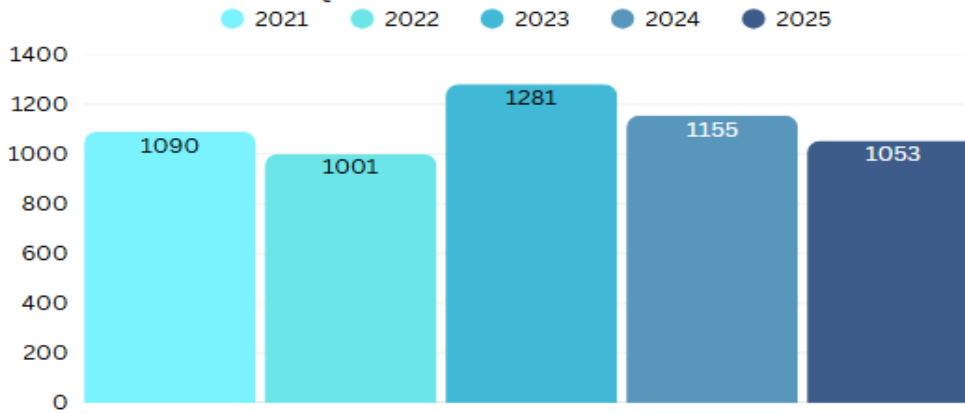
Total Crimes

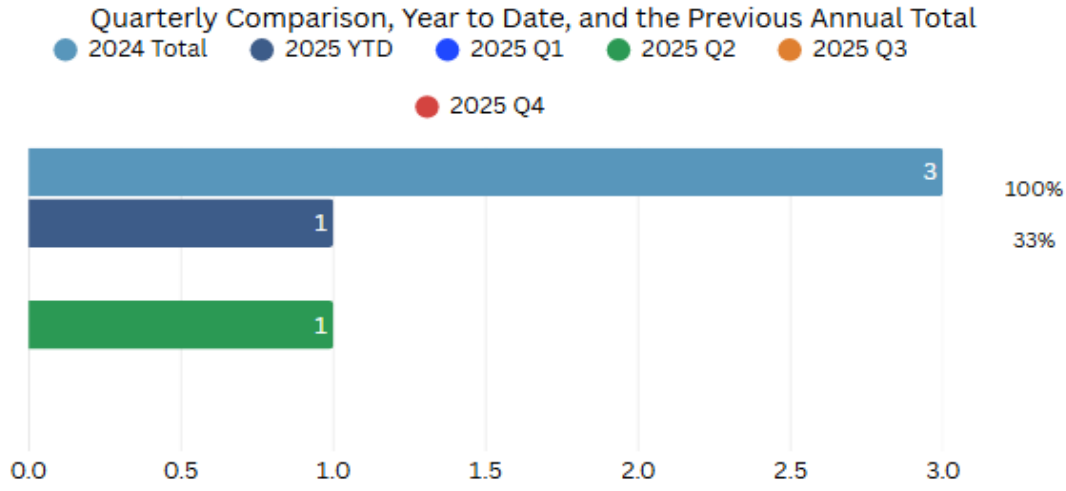
Quarter 4 Volume Over Five Years



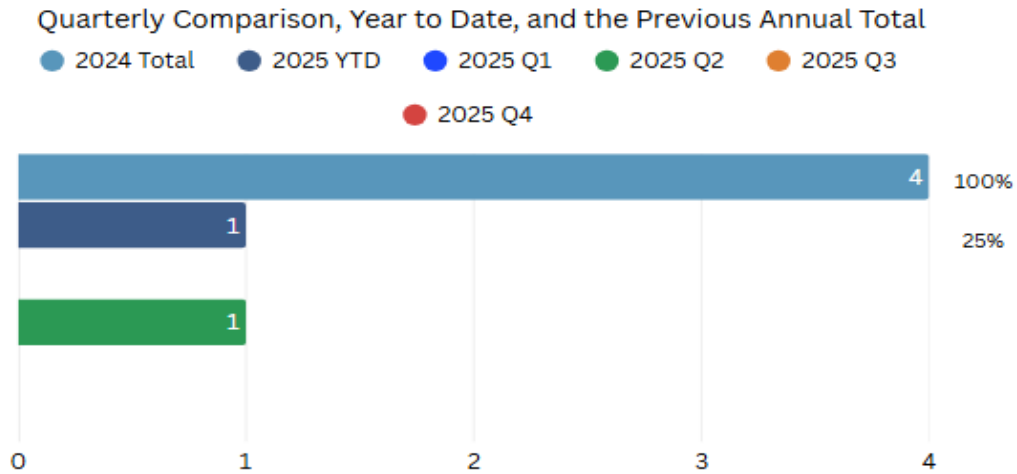

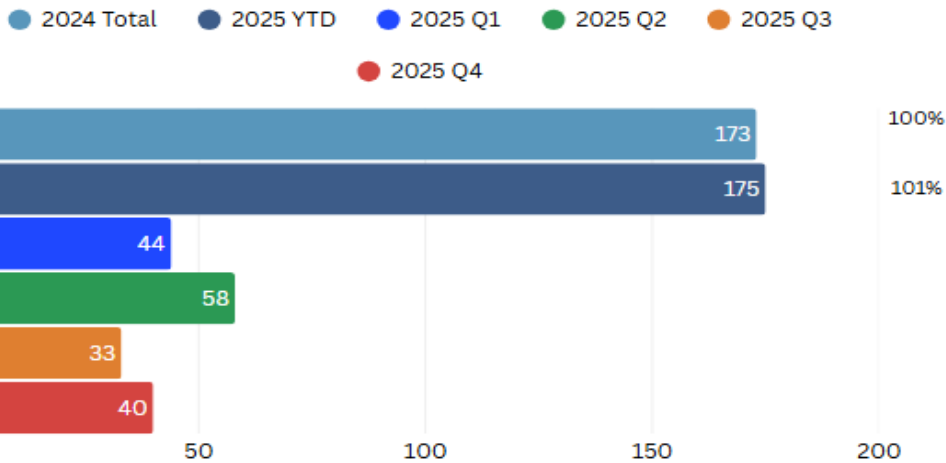

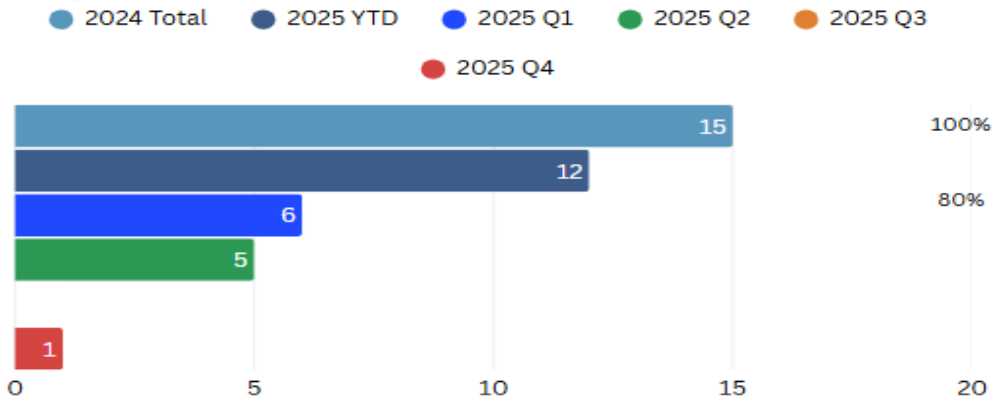

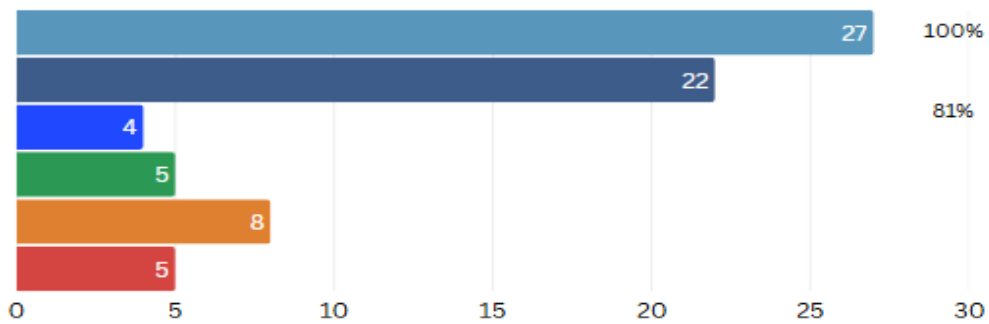

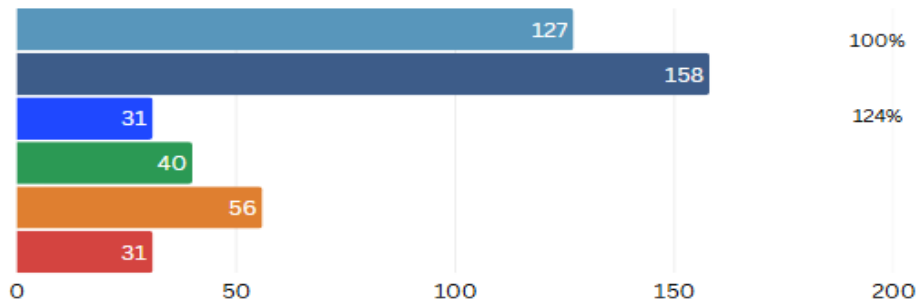

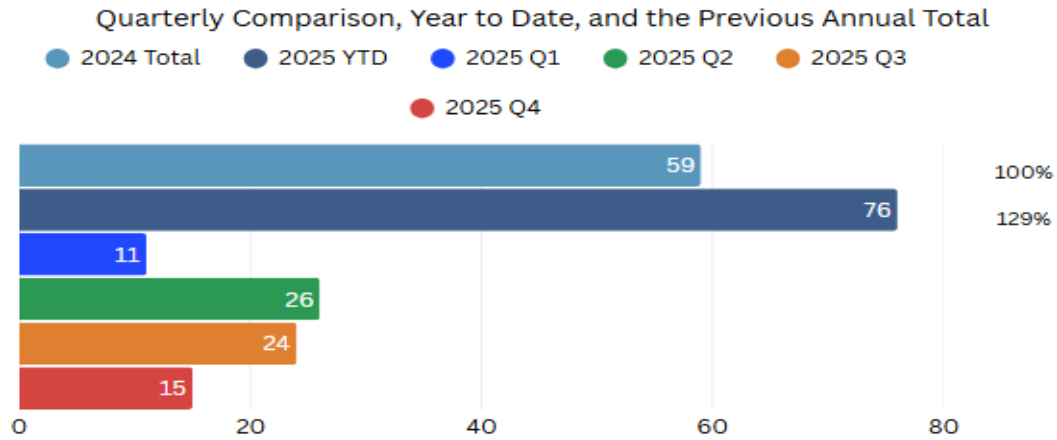

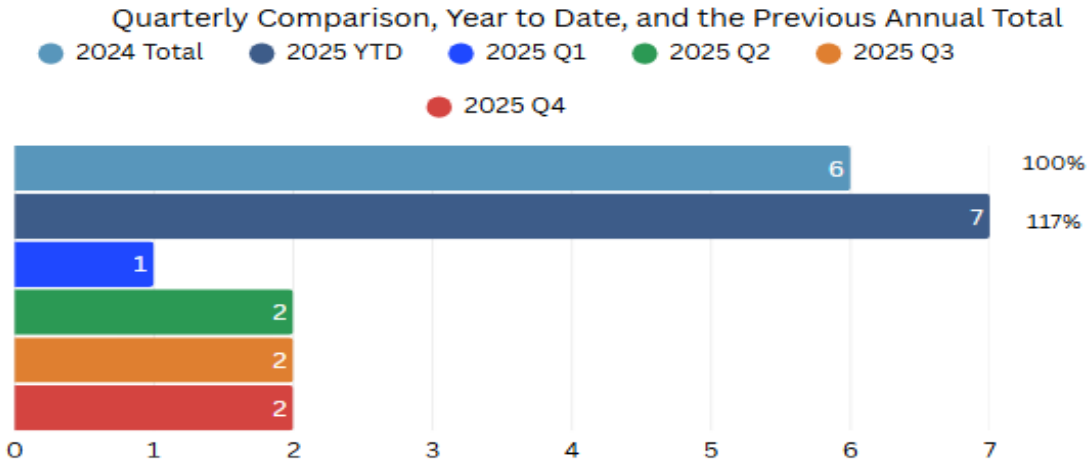

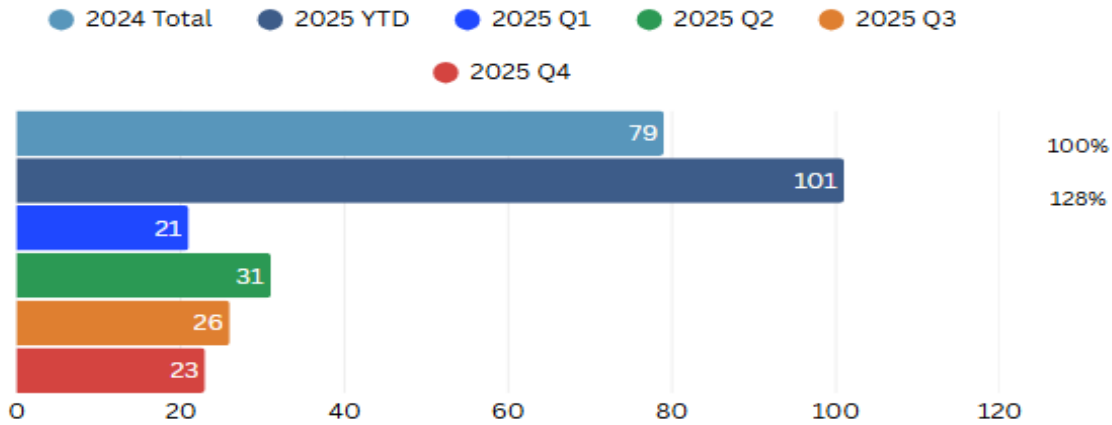

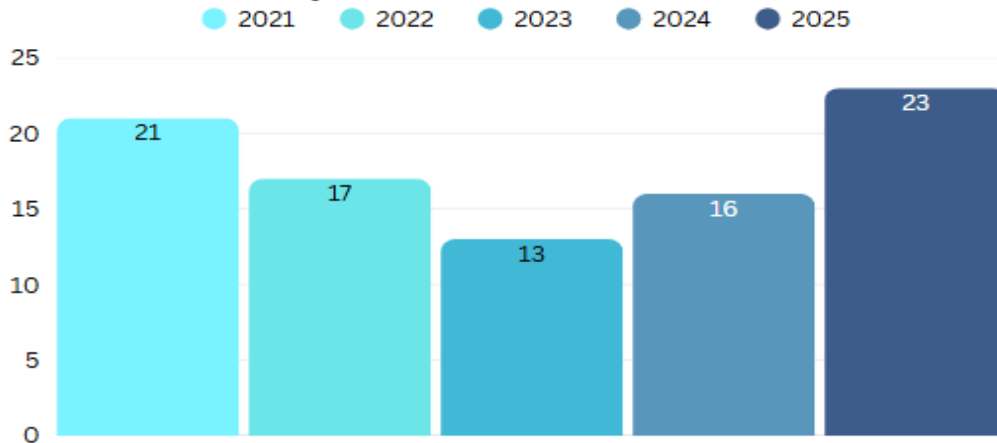

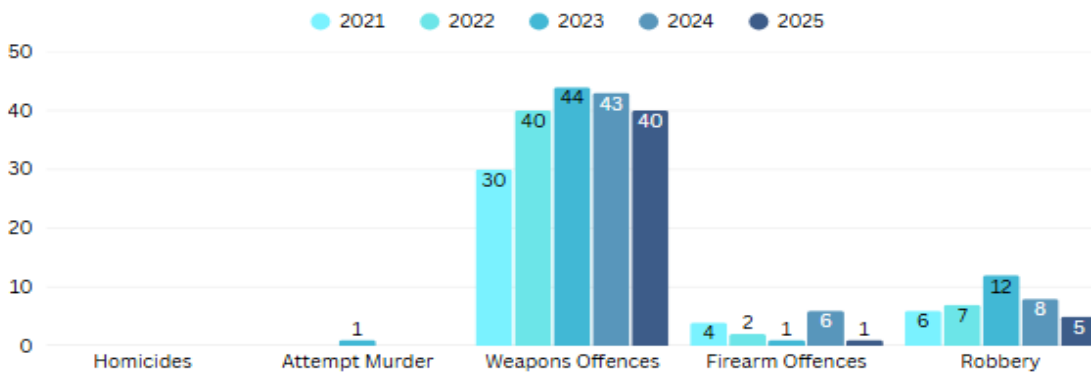

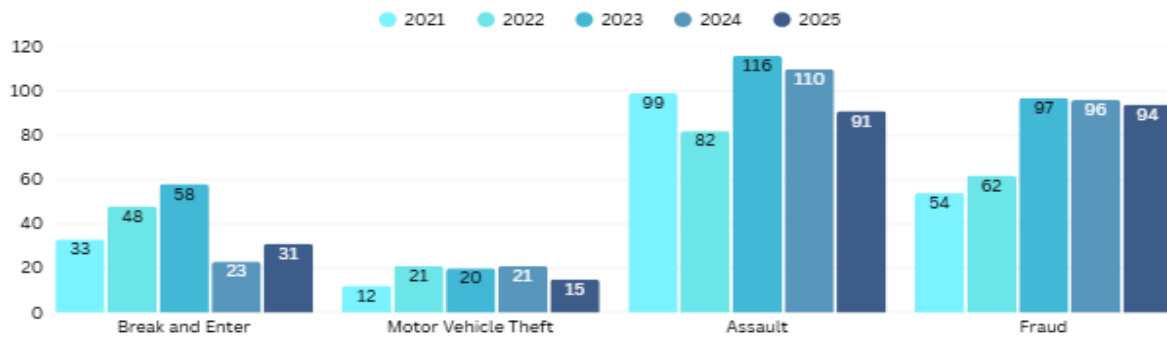
Crime Statistics

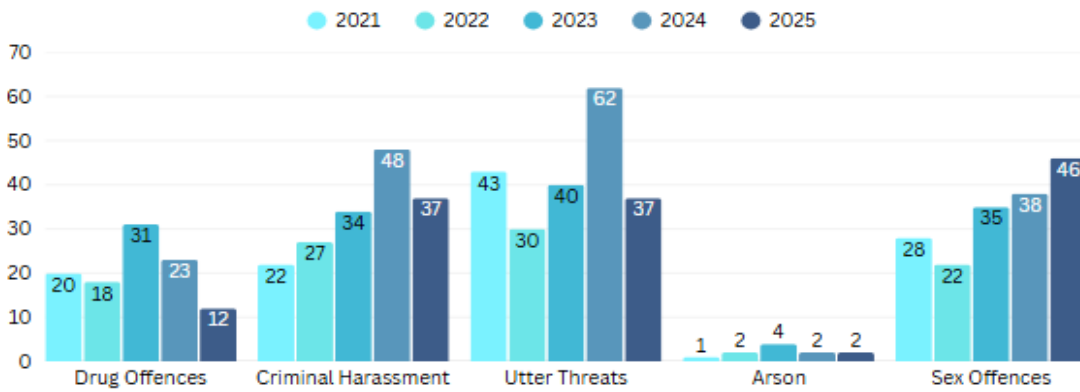

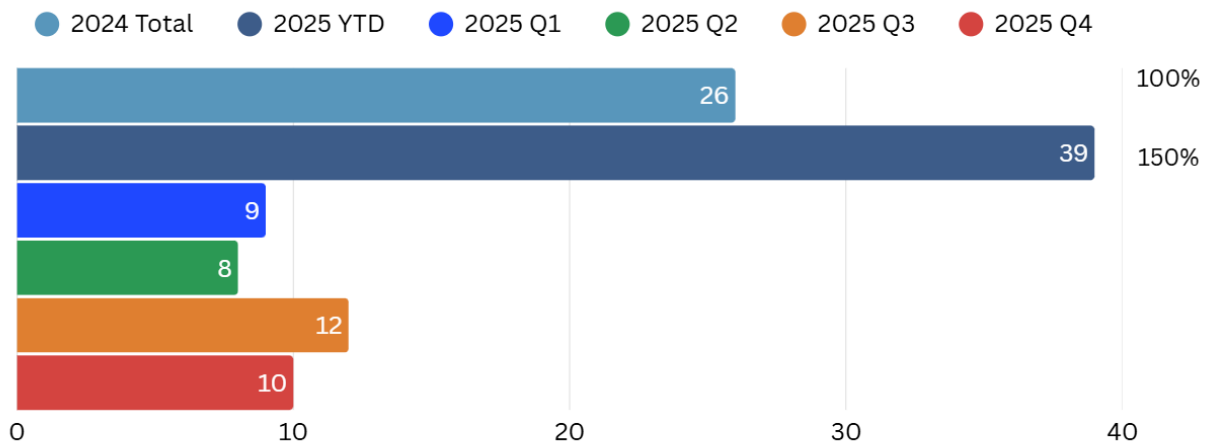

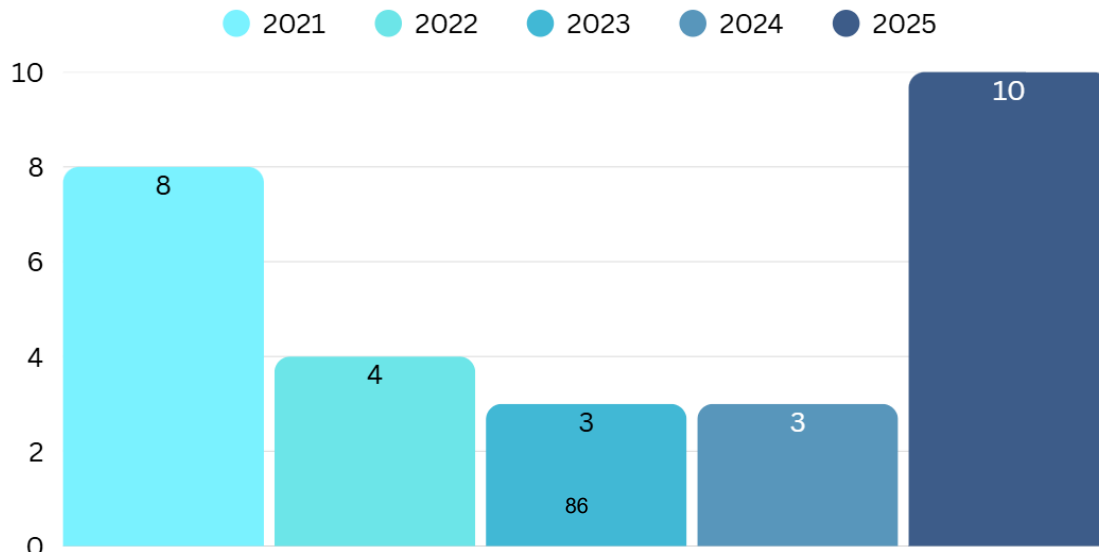

Quarterly Comparison, Year to Date, and the Previous Annual Total



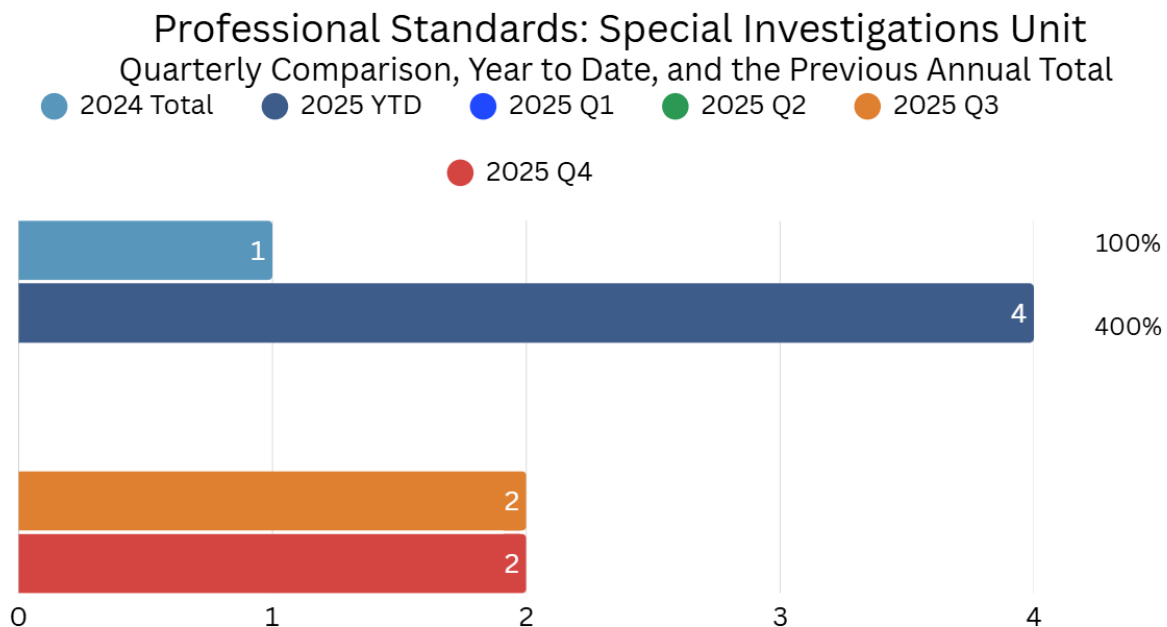

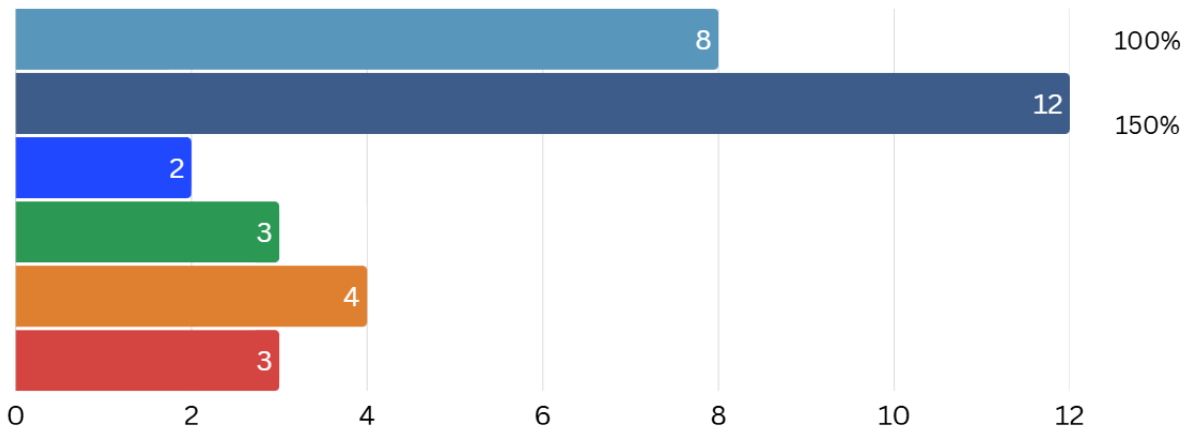

Quarterly Comparison, Year to Date, and the Previous Annual Total

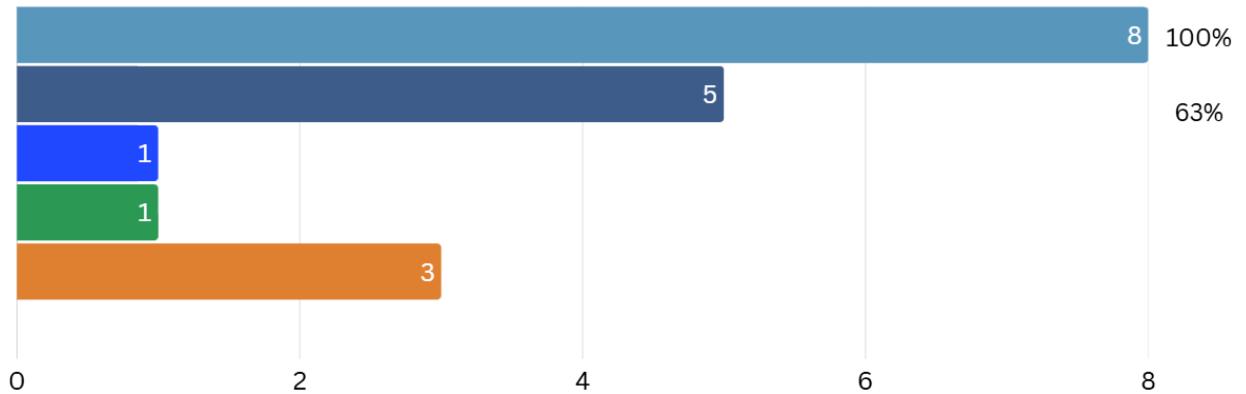

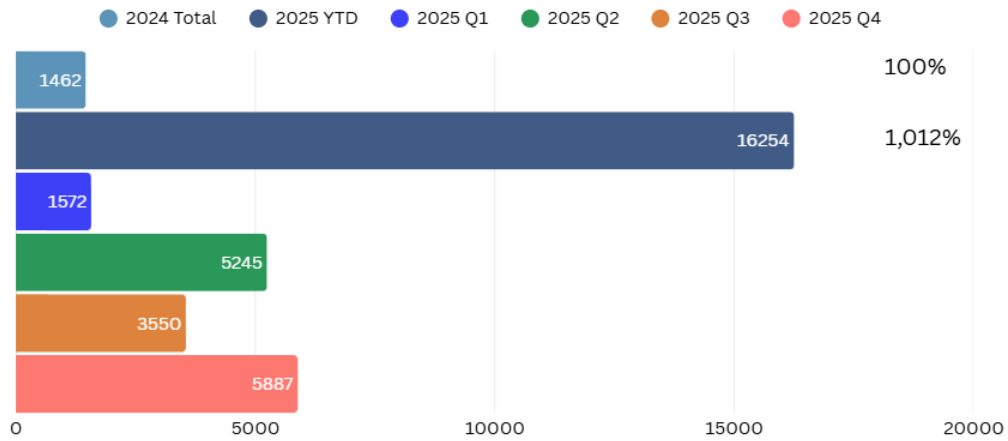

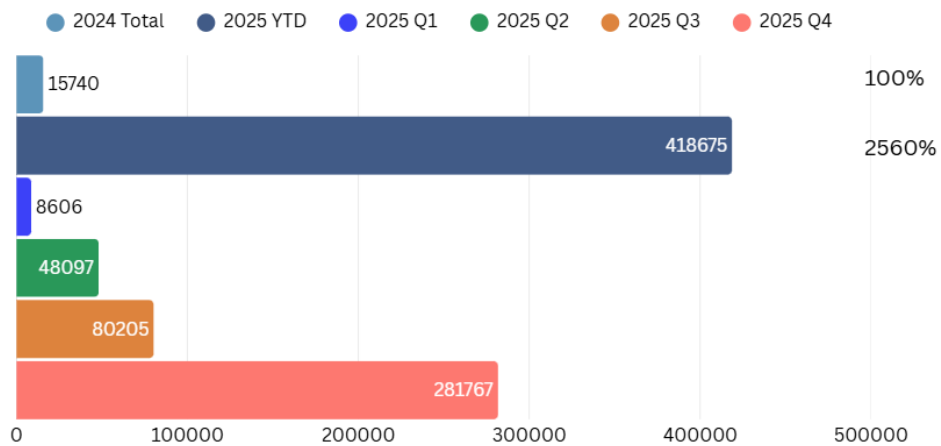

Facebook - Followers Comparison to Previous Annual Total



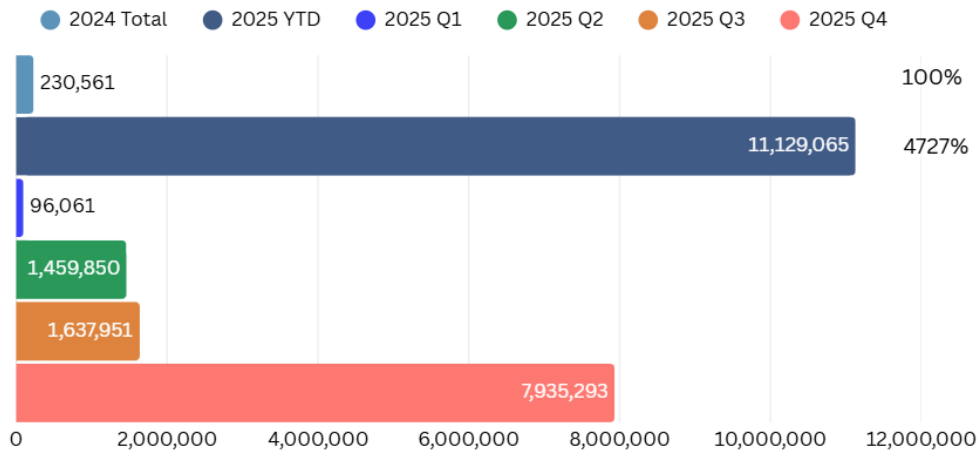
Facebook - Engagement Comparison to Previous Annual Total



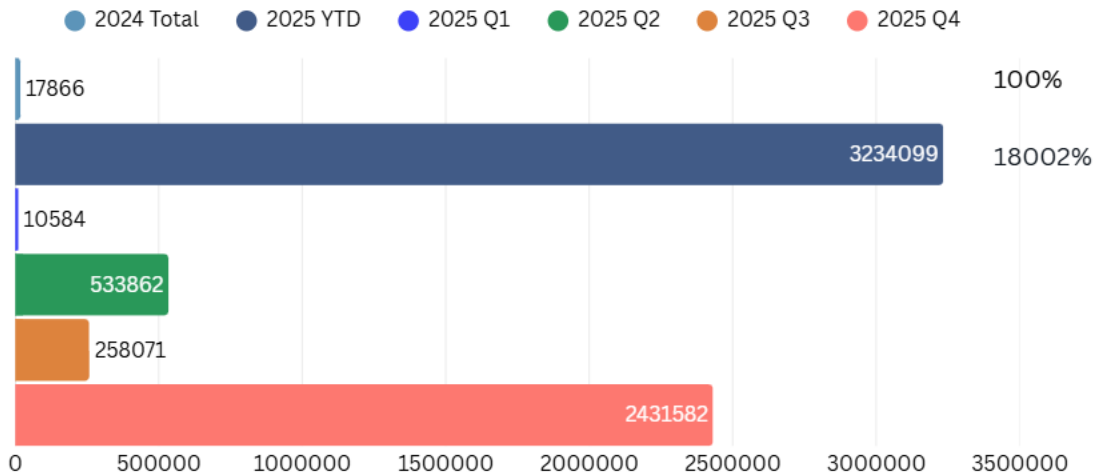

Facebook - Impressions Comparison to Previous Annual Total



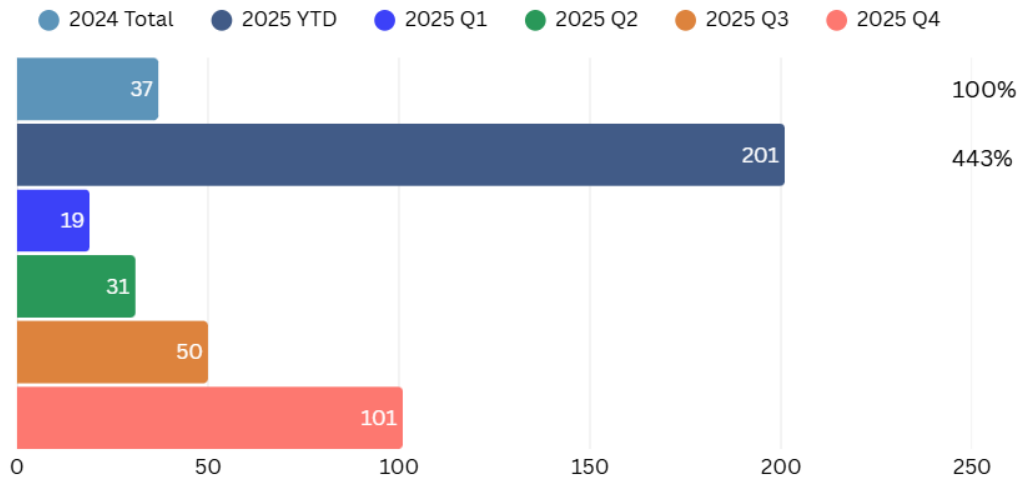
Facebook - Video Views Comparison to Previous Annual Total



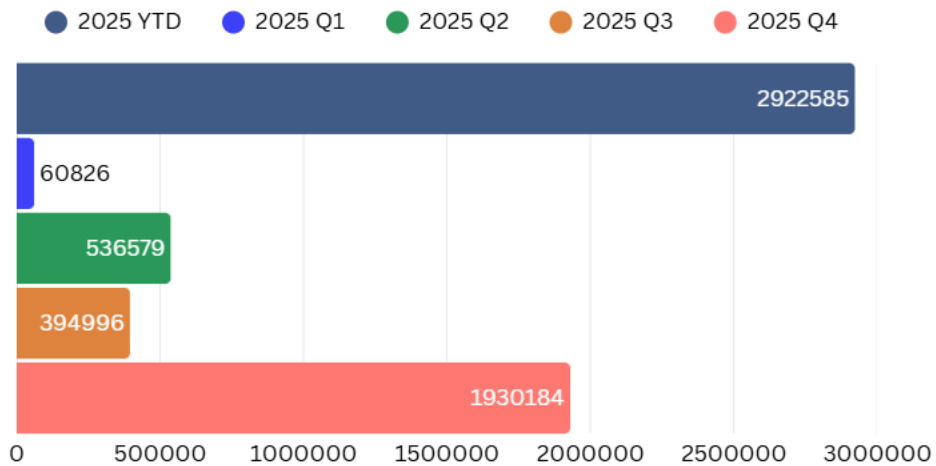

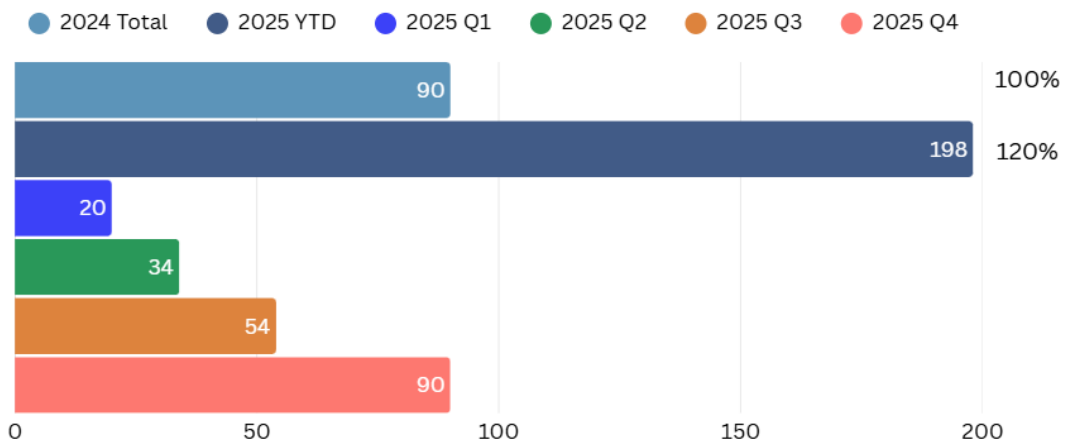

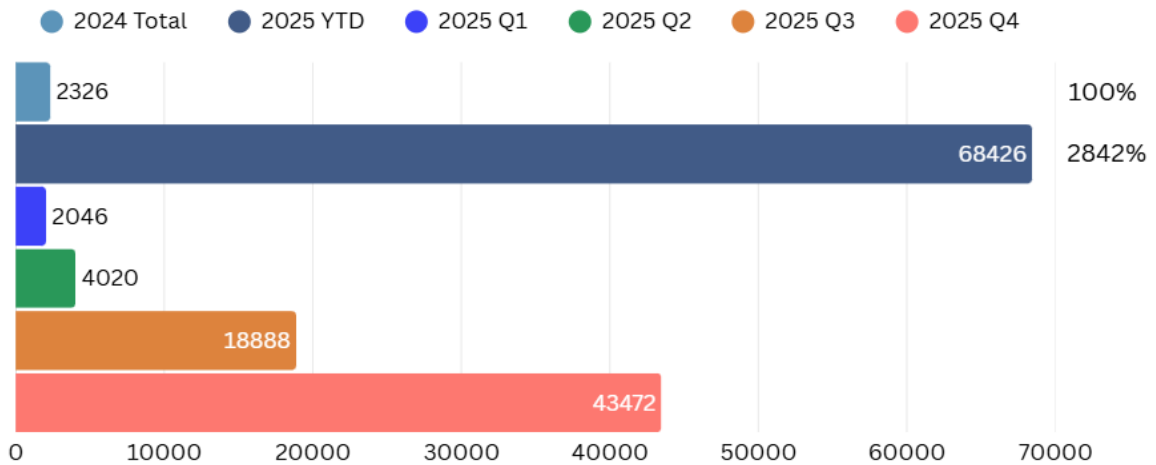

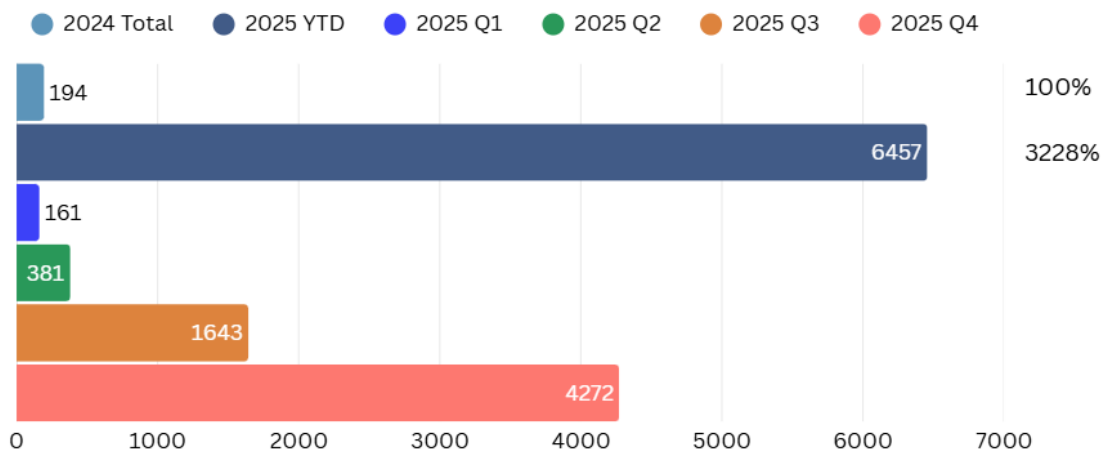

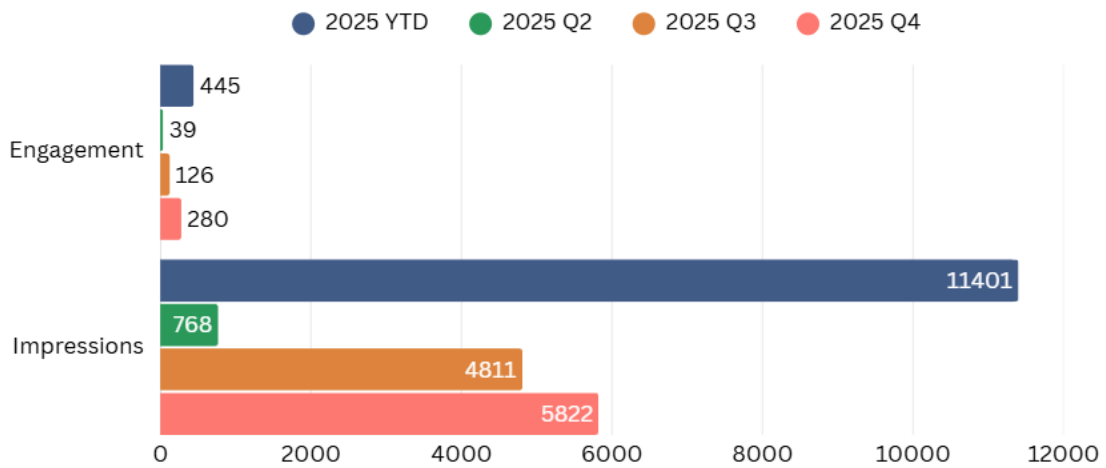

Karie Warner and Pete Lennox – the facilitators for the CSWP began the meeting with a review of some statistics for Belleville:

19% of Belleville residents diagnosed with mental health over the last two years

68.5% of homelessness is attributed to mental health issues

Only 50% of students report a strong sense of belonging at school

60% of homelessness identified substance abuse as part of the problem

20% of population one parent family and

12% of community are low income.

There was much discussion of intersectionality and intersectoral strategies to help deal with the above issues.

Coordination, access and navigation were seen as big issues and challenges as were lack of funding and lack of collaboration between organizations. There were some who attended who were well versed in the challenges and working on solutions, however it was acknowledged that there needs to be a deeper understanding of the landscape, who is in our community and the lack of resources to respond. It was identified that the solutions are not part of the municipalities' scope and that the people who were responsible for solutions were not in the room. Municipality has no social services they pay the county who is the provider.

Acknowledged that middle income demographics were also challenged with where to go for help or who to call.

Using 211 to coordinate referrals – they are updating their data base and have policy to renew it annually. It works well in other communities: of the calls there would be 85% referrals to agencies to help with the other 15% being over the phone advice. It was acknowledged that 211 should be optimized here in HPE.

CSWP should be ready for release in May – the Belleville Plan, may look something like this: It will be run by the advisory group to ensure the How and Now of it all:



Key Insights:

CAMSafe.ca is a community safety and investigative support platform that enables residents and businesses to voluntarily register security cameras for potential use in police investigations. The platform enhances investigative efficiency, strengthens community engagement, and delivers significant cost savings to police services across Ontario.



Partners with the Community

CAMSafe was launched by the Belleville Police Service in 2021 as a locally developed solution to support investigations and community safety. Since its launch, the platform has grown into a widely adopted, province-wide policing resource.

Importantly, CAMSafe is *silently* sponsored by the Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC), ensuring there is no direct cost to participating police services. This sponsorship model has allowed CAMSafe to scale across Ontario while remaining financially sustainable and no-cost for agencies.

Program Reach and Adoption:

- 27 police agencies actively using CAMSafe.ca
- 80+ communities across Ontario
- Adoption across municipal, regional, and provincial policing environments

CAMSafe has evolved from a local initiative into a collaborative, multi-agency platform supporting policing operations and community engagement province-wide.

Financial Impact and Cost Avoidance:

- Estimated \$217,000 in annual cost savings across all participating agencies
- Comparable commercial platforms cost approximately \$8,000 per agency per year (minimum)

This represents a significant cost avoidance benefit to police services and demonstrates the value of a shared, police-led technology solution.

Operational and Community Benefits:

- Speeds investigative workflows by quickly identifying potential camera locations
- Enhances public participation through voluntary, transparent registration
- Standardizes investigative tools and practices across agencies
- Reduces duplication of technology procurement across police services



Partners with the Community

Provincial Transition and Governance Update:

Ongoing meetings have been held with a joint committee of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and Toronto Police Service (TPS) to formally transition CAMSafe.ca into a provincial policing framework.

The proposed management and governance model mirrors the structure used for the Bail Compliance Dashboard, aligning CAMSafe with established provincial policing technology initiatives and cyber-security requirements.

The transition is being implemented in a phased approach:

1. Technical Transition
 - Transfer and validation of infrastructure, hosting, domain registration, integrations, and system dependencies (COMPLETED MARCH 2026)
2. Administrative Oversight (Currently Underway)
 - Establishment of long-term governance, ownership, and support models
 - Definition of accountability, roles, and operational responsibility
3. Communications and Promotion
 - Transfer of standardized media, branding, and promotional materials to a central hub
4. Formal Ownership Transfer
 - Anticipated transfer of CAMSafe through ownership of the CAMSafe trademark, which is officially registered to the Belleville Police Service Board, into the provincial framework

Since its launch by the Belleville Police Service in 2021, CAMSafe.ca has demonstrated measurable operational value, strong community adoption, and substantial cost savings across Ontario. CAMSafe represents a proven, scalable, and fiscally responsible community safety solution with lasting value to Ontario's policing environment.
